W. C. Green, agent for the A. A. White Townsite Co., appeared before the Board and asked that the lots owned by A. A. White Townsite Co. in the Village of Hamilton be reduced to \$2 a lot. On motion the proposition was denied.
On motion duly seconded and carried the item assessed to Perrault, Gariyy & Demarse in Bathgate Village, under item No. 18 at \$1500 be reduced \$600 and that the same be transferred from said item 18 and added to the assessment of their mill building, as the same is properly assessed as real estate, being part of the mill building, as set forth in sections 3232 and 3273 of the Revised Code.
