pursued in the cases that come before him. It is a fact that many probate cases in this county have necessarily had to be gone over again from the beginning, making considerable extra cost as well as delay and annoyance to the parties interested. There is no office in the county which needs the careful supervision of an experienced and educated man more than that of county judge.

FOR SUPT. OF SCHOOLS. F. M. SHERARTS.

Perhaps no public interest lies nearer the public heart than the public school system. Our public schools are at once our pride and our greatest care. Probably sixty per cent of our total taxation is for the support of common schools, voluntarily voted by the people. The supervision of the hundred or more school districts is one of the greatest importance. It requires the personal inspection of the different schools several times each year as well as the supervision of the teaching force of perhaps a half a hundred more. Mr. Sherarts has been on duty now for two years and he has been active and vigilant in all his many departments of labor in this direction. His accounts have been passed by the county board without any question of overcharges for mileage or per diem and the office work has been kept strictly up to date. His educational advantages are equal to the best, having graduated at both the college and normal courses and he has had long experience as a teacher in both country and town schools. Mr. Sherarts is also a republican.

Over in the Second Legislative District there is also some very good legislative timber.

FOR SENATOR. ALBERT GARNETT.

Mr. Garnett has already served the people of the second district in this capacity and his record is one of which they may be proud. He can always be found on the right side of every moral question and no man has better judgment to what is the best for the welfare of his immediate constituency as well as the county and state. Mr. Garnett is a man of large executive ability as is shown by his successful management of what is probably the largest farming interests in the county. Perhaps it would be difficult to select three men who would better bear the term "representative" whether taken in a business or political sense.

FOR COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.

First District A. B. PURDY, Third District ADAM NORTON, Fifth District WILLIAM BIGWOOD.

While it is not often that the question of political affiliations cuts any figure on the county board yet, for the reasons stated in our opening remarks, the majority of the county board should in this republican county be of that political faith. The gentlemen named by the republican party for these offices are all men of excellent repute and men who have had experience in township affairs and will come to their duties with well defined ideas of the work that comes before the board.

POLITICAL ASSASSINATION.

The Herald of Sunday has a long editorial, the substance of which is, that as this is an "off-year" it puts no figure politically whether Democrats or Republicans are elected, as only men are the issues.

This is as absurd as to say that the soldiers of a regiment could assassinate their own officers, select men to fill their places from the ranks of the enemy and then hope for future victory.

Over in Minnesota, owing to a factional fight in the Republican party two years ago, a large number of Republicans voted for and elected a Democratic candidate for governor; to-day bets are even if he isn't again elected, and there is no factional fight this time. And if he is again elected, it would not be a political improbability that Minnesota would again go Democratic two years from now, when even the Herald agrees that something besides men would be at stake.

Just all the county and state offices with Democrats in North Dakota this

year for personal reasons, and two years hence the Democrats would have an even chance to carry the state on straight party issues.

If the blind lead the blind both shall fall into the ditch. The Pink Paper announced that Paul Johnson had been selected by the county committee of the Democratic party to fill the place left vacant by the resignation of C. H. Asselstine as candidate for county judge. Of course this was an error, first on the part of the Pink Paper and second on our own part, as we ought to have known better and not have taken "the only Democratic paper in the county" as authority. We now hasten to say that Mr. Asselstine was a candidate for county judge and that Mr. Johnson has been selected to fill the place. We hope we have not seriously damaged the prospects of either candidate for election. It was a plain blunder and we have no excuse, and wonder if the Pink Paper has any.

Republican rallies have been held at several places through out the county during the week. We have no definite report except from Cavalier, where Senator McCumber on Monday night spoke to a full house many not being able to gain admittance. His speech is said to have been a very fine one and kept the audience interested to the close. Nearly all the Republican county candidates were present as well as the majority of the county committee, and editor Hager. There was a meeting of the committee and candidates in which campaign matters were discussed. All decided that the prospects were good for a Republican victory all along the line. The Pembina band went over to help set the pace for the triumphant march.

Commissioner Myrick in a well written article in this weeks Pink Paper answers some of the figures given in the St. Thomas Times. We have not the time this week to comment on the matters there discussed, except to say that the discussion of these matters will perhaps be of considerable value to the general public—as matters of public information if for nothing else. As a rule the voters don't think of these things as much as they should.

Agricultural College.

The course in farm husbandry begins October 15th, and continues five and one-half months each year. In three years a student can complete the course, which entitles him to a certificate of completion.
