

# WITH THE LAWMAKERS

Work Accomplished by the State Legislators.

The opening session of the North Dakota legislature Tuesday was not marked with any degree of importance, for before either the house or the senate was called to order the organization of both houses was arranged at, and all that remained to be done when the two houses were called to order was put through the states in each house that were fixed up at the caucuses.

In the house the insurgents held full sway. Efforts were made by the stalwart Republicans to win over some of the insurgent Republicans, and in this way perhaps overthrow the slate that was fixed up by the insurgents and Democrats. This, however, proved futile, for the insurgent Republicans went into session standing pat, and they remained pat throughout the entire selection of the organization.

The house was called to order by the chief clerk, after which prayer was offered by Rev. F. W. Stanton of the Baptist church of Bismarck.

Clark Moore of Cass county then placed the name of Treadwell Twichell of Cass county for speaker of the house in nomination. Before he had finished there were a number of the delegates from the different insurgent districts on their feet offering seconds.

The nomination of Representative Twichell for speaker was seconded by the Second, Seventh, Eleventh, Fourth, Fifth, Fifteenth and Thirty-first districts.

On the call for any other nominations for speaker, Frank Chapman of Williams county for the stalwart Republicans placed in nomination C. A. Johnson of Ward county for speaker.

This nomination was seconded by A. L. Martin of Sentinel Butte, C. W. Buttz of Sargent county, and several others. The Ninth district, which is included in Cass county, went solidly for Johnson, the representatives of that district going back on their own county candidate for the place and supporting the stalwart nominee.

There were ninety-six votes cast for speaker, there being four absentees. Twichell received seventy-three votes and Johnson twenty-three. Taking the Democratic vote from Twichell's leaves him fifty-nine insurgent votes that were cast for him.

The Senate Organization.

The senate was called to order by Lieutenant Governor Bartlett. Archdeacon Jones offered prayer, after which Lieutenant Governor R. S. Lewis of Fargo was given the oath of office. The oath was administered by Supreme Justice Morgan.

At Wednesday's session the house passed a bill to permit the board of the university and school lands to purchase municipal township, county and state bonds in conformity with recent constitutional amendments voted upon by the people. Heretofore the investment of the state's permanent school funds was limited to school and North Dakota state bonds. The bill undoubtedly will pass the senate under a suspension of rules as it did the house, in order to permit the board to purchase a large block of county bonds offered it.

In the senate Senator Shappe introduced a complete primary election bill which is understood to be acceptable to the stalwarts. Other bills introduced were for broadening the powers of police and city councils, making Labor day a holiday, forbidding any person from holding two elective offices under the state, county or city, or in county and city at the same time.

Two bills were introduced repealing the weights and measures inspection law, and one repealing the game law.

In the house Thursday Representative Casey introduced a bill taking the required constitutional steps to make the state's declaration in favor of the election of United States senators by popular vote. A bill also was introduced defining intoxicating liquor. This puts a number of "soft drinks" in the intoxicating class. The house then adjourned.

The following bills were introduced in the senate: Relating to realty mortgages, organization of counties, requiring railroads to report wreck and casualties, when any one is killed, to the railroad commissioners; making a revenue license stamp prima facie evidence of violation of the prohibition law; creating a board of control; giving \$150,000 to the university; creating a public health laboratory and director at the university; inspection of hotels and creating the office of hotel inspector at a salary of \$1,200; giving \$97,000 for maintenance and \$100,000 for improvements at the penitentiary; for an annual appropriation of \$10,000 for pure food enforcement; compelling transfer facilities at intersecting lines of road and a penalty for disobeying the railroad commissioners' orders thereto; for purchase of public utilities upon notice to public service corporations; permitting cities to become indebted for 25 per cent of their valuation, regardless of other indebtedness; to establish the Torrens land title act; an anti-pass law. It was noted that this bill was No. 23.

Preserves, Jellies and Jams—Illegal.

6092—Brand: Currant Jelly, "Orchard." Producer or jobber, Bliss Syrup Refining Company, Kansas City, Mo. Not currant at all; composed of apple juice and glucose. A glucose jelly.

6113—Brand: Red Raspberry Preserves. "Dragon." Producer or jobber, The Williams Brothers Company, Detroit, Mich. Not as represented; questionable.

6132—Brand: Fruit Jelly (by request). Producer or jobber, Griggs, Cooper & Company, St. Paul, Minn. Should be labelled glucose jelly.

Corn and Succotash, Peas, Beans, Tomatoes—Illegal.

6084—Brand: Tomatoes, "The Rosa." Producer or jobber, Zealand Canning Company, Zealand, Michigan. A poor tomato; large proportion of water.

Meats and Fish—Illegal.

6064—Brand: Pork loins. Producer or jobber, Armour and Company. Sulphites a trace; meat putrid in odor, etc.; unfit for food.

6157—Brand: Codfish (1lb.). "Genuine George's Codfish." Manufacturer not given. Borates present in large quantity.

6196—Brand: Codfish, "Norseman." Producer or jobber, Stone, Ordean and Wells Company, Duluth, Minn. Not codfish but hake; not properly labelled.

6218—Brand: Codfish, "Lion." Manufacturer not given. No preservatives present; not properly labelled.

6241—Brand: Codfish, "Fishhook." Manufacturer unknown. Jobber, George R. Newell & Company, Minneapolis, Minnesota. Not properly labelled.

6242—Brand: Codfish, "Opal." Producer or jobber, Cunningham & Thompson, Gloucester, Mass. Borates.

Syrups, Sugar, Honey, Candy—Illegal.

6043—Brand: Maple Syrup, "Canada Sap." Producer or jobber, National Syrup Company, St. Paul, Minn. Not pure maple syrup; not labelled properly.

6085—Brand: Sugar Syrup, "Banquet." Producer or jobber, John Sexton and Company, Chicago, Ill. Not a sugar syrup.

6117—Brand: Maple Syrup. Sent in by C. Healy, Fargo, North Dakota. An imitation product.

6229—Brand: Candy, "Jelly Beans." Producer or jobber, M. Dawson and Company, Chicago, Ill. Coal tar dye.

6272—Brand: Candy, "Marshmallow Banana Candy." Producer or jobber, Ziegler, Egan Company, St. Paul, Minn. Colored with coal tar dye.

6194—Brand: Baking Powder, "Queen." Producer or jobber, American Supply Company, St. Louis, Mo. Weight not given; composition not given.

6155—Brand: Cream of Tartar, (Bulk). Retailer, C. B. Thompson, Mandan, N. Dakota. Contains alum and phosphate.

6217—Brand: Cream of Tartar, (Bulk). Retailer, Haas Mercantile Company, Jamestown, N. Dakota. An alum compound.

4950—Brand: Catsup, "Helms." Producer or jobber, H. J. Helms Company, Pittsburg, Penn. Benzozate acid present in large amount.

4159—Brand: Tomato Catsup, "Club House." Producer or jobber, Franklin MacVeagh and Company, Chicago, Ill. Benzozate of soda present in large amount.

6158—Brand: Lemon Extract (Concentrated). Producer or jobber, Parke, Davis and Company, Detroit, Michigan. Not standard strength.

4197—Brand: Vanilla Extract. Retailer, C. A. Hawkins, Hillsboro, N. Dakota. An artificial product.

4199—Brand: Lemon Extract, Triple Strength, "Pearsall's." Producer or jobber, Pearsall Manufacturing Co., Des Moines, Iowa. An artificial product.

4092—Brand: Freeze-Em. Producer or jobber, B. Heller and Company, Chicago, Ill. Mainly sodium sulphites.
