THE COUNTY SEAT "RING."

When Pembina was the county capital, among other assets, hereditaments and appurtenances therunto belonging, was a certain "court house ring." While as "ring" was rather an intangible proposition in itself, and its composition and boundaries were never specifically defined, yet most people had a firm conviction in its existence, just as most persons in their hearts fear ghosts,—though they never saw one. When the records, and the other contents of the "old sheds" including the officials, were carted off in triumph to Cavalier, the "ring" went with the rest as an unseen but very real halo about the aggregation.

It was the one part of the court house furniture that Pembina people were very willing to see leave the town, as it had always been a bogey to every aspiring candidate who lived here. That ring however seems to have grown more tangible and near the new court house, perhaps from its finer surroundings, judging from the number of local candidates for county offices hailing from that city. Without actually counting, off-hand, we should say that so far, probably one-half of all the candidates for county office "mentioned" are either actual residents of Cavalier, or own residences there or will remain there anyway even if they do not succeed in getting elected. "The court house for Cavalier" seems to have a new significance in the approaching election.

"DRY" FOR GOOD.

The election across the river at St. Vincent on Tuesday resulted in a majority for the "drys" by fifteen votes. Last year with almost the same number of voters the election was a tie, which left the village dry. This year it was freely prophesied that the "wets" would regain the license, but the results seem to show that St. Vincent is in the "dry" column for good. Pembina is glad that it is so. Some people may think that we are glad for selfish reasons only, because they argue that the saloons at St. Vincent drew trade from this side of the river. This is however a disputed question. The principal loss to Pembina's trade was that persons spent money over there in the saloons that should have been spent for family necessities over here, which money never did St. Vincent any good, but was a loss to Pembina. It has been a common remark among Pembina people of all classes during the past year "That the closing of saloons in St. Vincent has been a good thing for—" usually actually naming the person or persons,—and that is why Pembina is glad that St. Vincent has gone dry and hopes that it will remain dry. Whisky, or whisky money does no one any good. Neither the man that drinks it, the man that sells it, or the town that licenses it, receive any benefit financially. It's strange but true.

"Some people are so unkind as to say that Cavalier has all there is coming to it for some time, in the handsome new court house and the county seat location."—Walhalla Mountaineer.

ASSESSOR LISTS

PARTIZAN VOTERS.

When the assessor goes on his rounds this month he will ask each voter whether he is a Republican, Democrat, Socialist or a Progressive. In the first place, you will have to register with him that you are one or the other of these—or else you cannot vote at all at the Primary election in June. The ballots provided at the primary will be one or the other of these mentioned and they will be the only ballots. The judges will hand you either one of them as you may choose but only as your name appears on the assessors list. You cannot register as republican with the assessor and then vote a democratic ballot. Better read twice for fear that you do not understand it.

Then again, look out and do not register as a "progressive" unless you want to vote on the "Bull Moose" ballot. That is what "progressive" stands for on the assessor's list and on ballot. The two factions of the republican party known as "stalwart" and "progressive" will both vote for their respective sets of candidates on the Republican ballot only. So if you are a republican, no matter whether you are a "stalwart" or a "progressive" republican, all you have to say to the assessor is that you are a "republican" and when it comes to voting, then you make your choice of candidates names appearing on the ballot accordingly, as candidates representing both factions will be printed thereon. But there will be no ballots for the "independent" voter and he need not go to the Primary polls, there will be nothing doing there for him.

Gov. L. B. Hanna has announced that he would like to have another term as governor. In his announcement he says that he wants the second term in order to complete plans for the benefit of the state which he has not yet had time to do. Gov. Hanna has given us so far a business administration, in fact the governorship is really a business office with very little of the political. It makes very little difference to the people of this state to what political party the governor belongs, but it does make a great deal of difference as to what kind of a business man he is. The revenues of the state are now very large, but on the other hand the needs are yet greater than the revenue. It needs a firm hand at the helm to keep our ship of state sailing along and yet not spread more canvas than can be safely carried. Gov. Hanna has a good record as a business man both as a private citizen and as governor, and there is no good reason for a change.

Hon. Thomas Hall, secretary of state sends us a copy of a compilation of the existing election laws of this state, which makes quite a bulky volume. Besides the statutes there is also an additional chapter containing decisions of the courts in reference to the many questions that necessarily occur in the translation of so much language and so many directions. This part will be of particular interest to election officers as it treats quite fully of the mistakes of voters in marking ballots. A very complete index accompanies the book. It is a good book gotten out at an opportune time.


