CONSUMPTION

Not more than twenty-five years ago, the general idea among ordinary people was, that consumption was almost entirely an inherited disease. It was thought to be practically incurable, and but few people thought it contagious.
 To-day, all the foregoing ideas have been proven wrong. While consumption is undoubtedly inherited, in that children of consumptive parents or ancestors from lack of natural vigor or physique are more liable to contagion, yet it is certain that consumption is certainly but rarely, if ever, a direct inheritance.
 It is now known that consumptive patients should be isolated to a certain extent, and that their sputum is deadly poison when its dried particles go floating on the air to be breathed by others.
 It is now certain that a large part of those afflicted, if taken in time, can be cured simply by the nature medicine of God's out-doors.
 When it is considered that consumption was the cause of more deaths than any other known disease, that discoveries mean very much to suffering humanity.
 As yet this gospel of health is still unknown to a very large number of people.

This week Mrs. J. E. Stevens of Grand Forks, one of the officials of the North Dakota Tuberculosis Association, has been in the city and with the assistance of lantern slides, has been educating the school children, teachers and the parents as to the dangers, and treatment of this disease.

Mrs. Stevens is an interesting speaker, and the work she is doing deserves the encouragement of every good citizen. It is an education that is needed. Both the patients and the relatives need it. Thousands of lives are lost every year through sheer ignorance.
 Perhaps comparatively few people even knew that the state of North Dakota has a tuberculosis sanitarium established out in the Turtle Mountain country, and that its establishment was largely due according to the testimony of Mrs. Stevens, to our own ex-state Senator Judson LaMoure, who as chairman of the appropriation committee, was most influential in getting the necessary appropriation.
 By united effort this disease can be put out of existence. Let us unite for self protection and for the protection of future generations.

The annual meeting of the Mississippi Historical Association will be held at Grand Forks on May 28th, 27th and 28th. This association to which our North Dakota Historical Association is affiliated, embraces in its membership a large number of University and other trained educational people most of whom are residents within the limits of the "Louisiana Purchase." It will be a very large gathering of talented men and Grand Forks is to be congratulated on this almost national gathering in a city of its size. An additional attraction will be an historical pageant, representing various epochs in the discoveries and explorations of the state of North Dakota, which has been gotten up under the direction of Dr. Libby, secretary of the State Historical Society and Prof. of History at the N. D. U. in which the characters will be presented by students at the U.

That three-cornered arbitration is still in progress, though Messrs Villa and Carranza have refused to stop fighting Huerta and are therefore considered out of it. As these generals are making a victorious progress towards the city of Mexico, it was hardly to be expected that they would halt, when the half would be entirely to the advantage of Huerta. Huerta just now is threatened on the south by Zapata, on the east by general Funston and on the north by Villa, and he isn't too sure of the people just around him. In the meantime the armistice between this country and himself is giving him a splendid opportunity, which he said to be improving, of mining the railroads between Vera Cruz and Mexico city so as to blow them up if the U. S. forces make any advance in the future. It looks as though something might happen down there at any time, that would conclude the arbitration business very quickly.

Will E. Holbein, of Lansford wants the nomination for Commissioner of Agriculture and Labor. Mr. Holbein has been the secretary of the North Dakota Press Association for several years and if he makes as good a commissioner as he has secretary, there will not be much more to be desired in this important office. He has shown himself a hustler for the newspaper people and we think he will show the same qualities in the service of the state.
