MILLIONAIRE SLAIN BY SON

GENERAL HIRAM DURVEA SHOT TO DEATH AS HE SLEEPS.

Seven Bullets Fired into Body By Boy Believed to Have Been Demented.

New York, May 6.—In a cell in a Brooklyn police station, Chester Durvea, who fired seven bullets into the body of his father, Hiram Durvea, millionaire starch manufacturer and veteran of the civil war, killing him instantly, talked incoherently of the events leading up to the shooting and gave evidences of being insane.

Before his arraignment in court, Durvea became violent and beat on the doors of his cell with his bare knuckles. A policeman was stationed outside the door to prevent him from injuring himself seriously. When Durvea was arraigned he appeared more rational. He said he had no attorney but wanted one, so the examination was postponed until tomorrow.

General Hiram Durvea, 81, was a retired millionaire starch manufacturer and civil war veteran.

The murder occurred on the porch at the rear of the Durvea home, where both father and son were in the habit of sleeping. Chester Durvea, who is 43 years old, slipped from his cot into the house where he kept several rifles, revolvers and shotguns for hunting purposes. He selected an automatic pistol and a magazine rifle, both of which he loaded and returned to the open-air porch. Standing within a few feet of his sleeping father, he first fired from the rifle and then emptied the revolver.

No Reason Given for Murder.

Chester Durvea would give no reason for killing his father when taken in custody. For the last few days, servants told the police, he had been acting strangely and they had feared a return of a previous breakdown. In 1909 when he showed signs of mental trouble his father sought to have him removed to Bellevue hospital for observation, but, as he was not violent, this request was refused.

Marshalltown, Ia., May 6.—Damage to the extent of \$15,000 was caused by a windstorm which swept through the southeastern part of Marshall county. Several small buildings were unroofed.

Tampico Rebels Menacing.

Vera Cruz, May 6.—The constitutionalists at Tampico have notified Rear Admiral Mayo, commander of the American warships stationed there, that if any of his vessels attempted to enter the Panuco river the oil reservoirs above the city would be emptied and the oil ignited which would mean certain destruction to the town. This situation was reported by the commander of the United States torpedo boat destroyers Jenkins, which arrived at Vera Cruz from Tampico.
