#### PROGRESS OF THE WAR.

Again we have the report "no progress." By this we do not mean that nobody has been killed or wounded. The slaughter has been going on probably more fiercely than ever. Apparently the Kaiser has been making a supreme effort to break through the allies position in Flanders near the Belgium sea coast. The finest troops of the German army have been hurled against the allies without avail, except slaughter. Both armies have lost heavily, but the battle lines remain about the same. There are daily and sometimes hourly assaults all along the 200 mile frontier but neither side finds a weak place. To add to the discomforts of the men, it snowed several inches in Belgium last Sunday.

In the far east the Germans after retreating about a hundred miles in East Poland have again made a stand and at last advised a four day battle had been in progress, the final result of which may have considerable effect on the general aspects of the war, and particularly on the armies in Belgium. From the other two armies of the Russians in Galicia and East Prussia the reports as usual are too conflicting to give much credit to either side.

#### CANADA AND THE MONROE DOCTRINE

While it is not probable under the present outlook that Germany will invade Canada, yet there is a remote possibility which makes very important questions come before the American people.

Under the very general terms of the Monroe doctrine the continent of America is not open to the dominion of any European nation. This part of the Monroe doctrine is generally accepted by all Americans, and at least not denied by European countries.

But after this basic proposition follow many rather dubious questions. It is manifest that if, say, any small South American republic should give grave cause of offence against any European country, that one of two things would necessarily happen; either the United States would see that ample reparation be given or else allow the offending republic to be chastised by the nation of fended.

With such republic we might deal because it would be an independent power, and our dealings would not necessarily bring us into European complications. But here we have the present status of Canada, which almost directly involves us into the complications of the European war, at least in theory.

Canada is not an independent nation. It is a part of the British empire. With the rest of the empire Canada is at war with Germany and Austria.

Now it is manifest that under the ordinary rules of warfare that Germany has the right to send a fleet, and an army to this side of the ocean and if possible to subjugate Canada, even as the allies have already taken possession of various German colonial possessions in Africa and other parts of the world.

As a general rule, when warring nations make peace, each is entitled to such territory as they occupy at the time.

Such a rule would therefore bring subjugated Canada under the government of Germany.

But what about the Monroe doctrine? Some argue that we should prevent Germany from landing troops in Canada. Some argue that we might let them take the country temporarily but to make them give it up after the war. Both these assumptions carry some difficult problems. The first would at once practically force the United States to join the allies. The second might equally involve us in war with Germany, with perhaps a more doubtful result. We could more easily prevent the landing of the Germans than to drive them into the sea after they were established in Canada.

Then comes another question, whether there really is anything involving danger or unfriendliness to this country, in merely exchanging the government of Can-

ada from one European king to that of another.—The one great weakness of the Monroe doctrine is that a European country already dominates part of the continent.

We are very much afraid that our famous Monroe doctrine will have to be modified in many respects before we get through with the world.

It is hard enough to raise a family of one's own, but when one attempts to take charge of all the children of his neighbors, he is likely to have his hands pretty full.

#### ANOTHER DRY STATE

Undoubtedly the greatest prohibition wave that ever swept over any land occurred this week when the czar of Russia ordered the total prohibition of the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquor in his dominions, containing about 150,000,000 people. That this enactment will have full and immediate force is certain for two reasons: one that the manufacture and sale of "vodka" the national drink is a monopoly of the government, and the other is that punishment for disobedience of the czar's ukase perhaps means transportation to Siberia.

Another "ukase" from the supreme court of the United States has made all northern Minnesota "dry" Crookston and East Grand Forks are out of the Indian limits but all the rest of that part of the state is affected. Two years ago Bemidji had thirty-five saloons.

#### THE ENORMOUS COST

England is making a loan of a billion and a quarter of dollars to carry on the war. The prime minister estimates that the cost of one year's war will be 450 millions of pounds.—These figures are too large for the average mind to grasp at once,—and this is the cost to England alone, which at least for the present has by far the least men in the field. When figures are compared with the number of men in the field from France, Austria, Germany and Russia, not to mention a half dozen smaller countries, the money cost of the war is so stupendous that one can but wonder where the money will come from. To a great extent if not altogether, this enormous expenditure is not only wasted, but is used for the sole purpose of destroying other property as well as men's lives.

The demand for money will perhaps have as much, if not more, influence in bringing peace than the lack of men.
