TWELVE MONTHS OF WAR

The European nations have now been at war for twelve months and the war is not ended. So far the only definite results are that the number of men engaged, the extent of battle lines, the expenditure of powder and shell, the work of the airplanes and the submarines, the cost in money and human life, all make this the greatest war of history, and in many of these respects it is not all, unique in history.

Nearly all those who have studied the figures agree on the fact that at least 20,000 men are either killed, wounded or missing in every day of the war. This means that at least 7,000,000 men have been taken from the ranks either permanently or for some longer or shorter period. When one adds to this the calculation the amount of powder and shell that it took to kill, maim or capture this vast amount of men, the wonder is how any one or any number of countries could stand the drain for as long a time.

Nevertheless, all the warring countries are publicly stating that they have plenty of resources left, men, money, and munitions, to keep up the fight for an indefinite period to come, and all express themselves as certain of final victory. To us the very fact that these countries have been able to stand so terrible a drain of men, money and munitions, is proof that the time is shortly coming when this strain will be greater than some of the countries can stand.

Perhaps the great outstanding feature of the war is the wonderful resources and powers of endurance shown by Germany. This backed by an apparatus of perfect organization has made her a match equal if not superior to her adversaries who have had the call of the world at their command.

On the other hand, allowing for the fact that soldiers and cannon and shells cannot be made at once, yet France,

England and especially Russia have seemed rather slow in getting their armies together and to equip them. While the British navy is doing well in holding the seas yet as a destructive force it has not yet shown any special action. Probably, however, the allies would say that they are better prepared for war at the present than they were a year ago, which perhaps is true in trained soldiers, and munitions and organization but hardly shows in the numbers of recruits.

In England especially, from this side of the ocean, it would look as though the English have been so cocksure that they would win that they have not bothered themselves to any great extent to provide either the men or the munitions necessary to win.

Just now with the Germans winning right along in Russia there is likely to be an awakening in both England and France.

Some such apathy was shown in the North in our own civil war. Southern victories however, brought the northern people to a full understanding of what they were up against, and then the North drew on her superior resources of men and materials, and with this added power Gen. Grant started in "to fight it out on this line if it took all summer."

Gen. Joffre evidently believes in trying to just hold the Germans until they become exhausted. The Kaiser believes in fighting all the time somewhere. Sometimes he transports his armies west sometimes he hurls his armies against the Russians in the east, but always fighting.

Which of these two systems of war are will win is yet a question of the future. But it is an old proverb of war to keep on the offensive.

NORTH PAYS TAX.

Thirteen states compose the backbone of Democracy. These are Alabama, Mississippi, Arkansas, Louisiana, Texas, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Virginia, Tennessee, Oklahoma and Kentucky. Here the party of Democracy rules supreme. They are considered upon once in four years to uphold the traditions of the Solid South. Under the Wilson administration representatives from these states practically control legislation.

It is interesting to note what the section comprising these thirteen states contributed in the shape of the income taxes. They turn into the federal treasury less than \$2,000,000 of the \$41,000,000 collected from the entire nation. Of the corporation tax they only contributed \$2,500,000 out of \$38,000,000 collected. In other words, the states responsible for the taxation measures under the personal and less than nine per cent of the corporation income tax. This may explain the enthusiasm of Democratic leaders south of the Mason and Dixon line over this form of taxation.

Nine northern states paid eighty per cent of the personal and two thirds of the corporation income tax. These very states also were hardest hit by the Democratic tariff laws. This is one of the reasons the North did not yield the revenue estimated by Secretary McAdoo of the United States treasury.—Grafton Record.

What will be the outcome of the investigation remains to be seen but that the opposition goes to the people pretty well demoralized on the leading issues, there is no doubt.
