The threshers will be at work next week.

They were halted by the soldiers on guard but paid no attention, we are told they were followed up and arrested at one of the hotels, made to dress and taken to the lock-up for the balance of the night. The men claim they did not hear the challenge and for that reason did not stop. They were on their way to Crookston to take part in the races and it happened at ten o'clock at night. No fine was imposed when they were liberated the next morning.


