Resolutions of School officers passed at the meeting at Cavalier Saturday Oct. 30th.

Resolved: Whereas it is the unanimous opinion of the school officers in meeting assembled that a competent nurse should be employed to visit all schools in the County, and examine all children for physical defects. We therefore, respectfully submit this resolution to the Hon. Board of County Commissioners of Pembina County for their consideration, with the request that they take steps to engage such a nurse. We deem such a measure will meet with the approval of the tax payers of the County, as authentic reports, presented at this meeting, from counties where such a safeguard for the health of the children is provided, show the benefits derived far in excess of the expense incurred.

Resolved: That school officers throughout the County co-operate in a strict enforcement of the law providing for the attendance of all children of school age, and, where possible, use their influence with parents and guardians to continue sending their children to school after they have passed the age of compulsory attendance.

Resolved: That the practice of providing a hot noon lunch in the rural schools of the County be continued.

Resolved: That school officers encourage and co-operate with the teachers in the holding of industrial contests in the schools of the County.

Resolved: That school directors take more personal interest in the work of the schools, such as, employing competent teachers, aiding teachers in carrying out measures which tend to raise the standard of efficiency in the schools and paying strict attention to the sanitation of all buildings. Be it further resolved: That school boards at the next annual meeting of school officers, report on the improvements made during the year in the fulfillment of the measures enacted in the foregoing resolution.

Resolved: That a vote of thanks be tendered to the officers who presided at this meeting, and to all those who took part in the program, we wish to voice our appreciation of the instructive discourses rendered. We wish particularly to thank Supt. Beatrice Johnstone of Grand Forks Co. for her able and highly edifying treatise on safeguarding the health of school children.


