The Auto Show.

It was our privilege to spend a couple of days at the automobile show at Grand Forks last week and we enjoyed meeting people from different places of the northern part of the state besides seeing the many changes which have taken place in the construction of this comparatively new mode of travel, since a year ago. There are two things about the changes made that must appeal to the casual observer. One is the reduction in prices and the other is the greater value there is for the money over that offered a year ago.

Most of the popular medium priced cars were represented by experts from the factories who were there to explain the construction of their cars from the crude material to the assembled machine as it stood ready for the road. To the average person their stories sound a good deal alike but they differ materially if they are analyzed.

From what we could learn from these experts the present European war enters extensively into the automobile business in this that raw material has been steadily advancing in price and the scarcity of the material itself is forcing many of them to limit their output to what they otherwise would do if there was no war. We were told that many of the smaller companies are already substituting malleable iron in place of steel wherever it is possible to do so. This of course impairs the service of the car when it comes to durability. Most of the older companies have prepared for this shortage but it is hard telling what will happen next year if the demand from the European market continues.

There were upward of fifty automobiles displayed in the Auditorium building, and the accessories were well displayed. The motor cycle and the bicycle were very much in evidence and one could not help but recall the displays of fifteen years ago when each boy has a bicycle. Automobile tires have gone up in price as will the auto if present conditions continue.
