**Food Day Proclamation.**

We are informed by the United States Food Commission, and other authorities, that in order to supply our Allies in Europe with sufficient food during the next year it will be necessary to send them much greater amounts than usual in times of peace. That the special needs will be wheat, flour, meat and sugar.

It is proposed by these authorities to gain these extra supplies needed for exportation by substituting in place of these, other foods of which we have great abundance as well as by special economy and by avoiding all waste.

In pursuance of the recommendations and request of these authorities and the necessities of the case as shown and known, I, as Mayor of the City of Pembina, hereby appoint

**TUESDAY OF EACH WEEK**

as a day of abstinence from all foods made from wheat flour, and also appoint

**FRIDAY OF EACH WEEK**

as a day in which substitutes shall be used on our tables for all meat products; and recommend that all the citizens of this city combine to make this the regular custom as long as the war makes it necessary.
