**Some Yields.**

Sam Leathers threshed seventy five bushels of wheat from two acres of land. The rest of his crop was light but a good sample.

George Martineau, who farms three quarter sections of land between the Pembina and Tongue rivers is some farmer. He threshed thirty bushels to the acre. The sample is good and will probably grade No. 1 Northern.

H. P. Ottem, who farms on the Red river south of town had the lightest crop he harvested for many years he says. His wheat went ten bushels to the acre. His summerfallow was too heavy and the growth was too rank when the hot weather set in the first part of July.

William Lembke got eighteen bushels to the acre on his several hundred acres he is farming up the Pembina river. It is as clean as if it was picked for exhibition purposes and will make fine seed for next year. Mr. Lembke says that part of his wheat went considerably below his average and some of it above.

Among our contributions this week is a tomato raised by Mrs. John McCaffery that weighed even one pound and is perfectly sound and ripe. Also a bag of plums raised in Mayor Miller's orchard that are large and of a delicious variety. Mr. Miller had one tree that had over a half bushel of plums on it which is the heaviest yield produced any year. This goes to show that we are in the fruit belt in earnest this year.


