The promised high water in the Red will not inconvenience people around here. Indications are that we will have a good stage of water however. The weather has been exceptionally cold the past week and the tributaries are still frozen hard and very little water is running in as the main flow from the south speeds on north. The ice is still solid in the middle and crossing to St. Vincent is being made by the two boats, one on each side. It will take a ten feet rise to inconvenience people in town. Last Monday the water began to fall at Grand Forks and it generally takes seven days for it to get here. At the rate it is raising four feet more will place it at the highest stage here.
