Thomas Murray was born at The Hermitage, Roxburghshire, Scotland, and departed this life at Bowsmont, N. D., April 22nd, 1920, in the eightieth year of his age. Mr. Murray was the second son of George and Margaret Murray who came to Canada when Thomas was but four years old, locating near Smith's Falls, Ontario. In 1879 the family came to what is now North Dakota, settling in the Red River Valley a few miles east of Bowsmont. The privations of those pioneer days developed a sturdier type of character than is common today. In 1891, Thomas, who had remained in Ontario, joined the family, and has been a familiar figure in this community for a quarter of a century. He was a genial, kindly soul, with a pleasant word for every one. Among his circle of friends Tom Murray will be missed for many a day. Funeral services, at the Methodist church, were conducted by the pastor, Rev. W. E. Vater, and by Dr. J. G. Moore, a long-time friend of the deceased. Both addresses paid tribute to the real worth and upright character of the man. Beautiful flowers expressed the sympathy of friends and suggested the resurrection hope. In this family of nine children, only three remain, John Murray of Kingston, Ont., Mrs. John Gemmill of Almonte, Ont., and Margaret Murray of Bowsmont. The devotion and self-sacrificing care of Miss Murray for her aged brothers and other members of the family is worthy of special mention here. Bowsmont friends deeply sympathize with her and with the brother and sister, at a distance.
