Mr. John Halcrow Sr., died at her home at Bowesmont, N. D., on Sunday morning, May 2nd, 1920, at 4 a. m., age 77 years and 6 months.

The deceased had not been well for the past week but the end came unexpectedly. Mrs. Halcrow's maiden name was Elizabeth Manson; she was the youngest daughter of William and Barbara Manson and was born in Shetland Islands, Scotland on November 7th, 1842. On November 8th, 1864 she was married to John Halcrow and of this union were born eleven children, all of whom are yet alive except William who died in childhood. Mr. and Mrs. Halcrow came to North Dakota from Ontario, Canada in March 1881, and were among the earliest settlers here.

Mrs. Halcrow was a member of the Methodist church from childhood, she loved the church and was a most devoted and faithful member up to the time of her death. The Bible was truly the rule of her faith and practice and in its pages she found her sweetest comfort and inspiration. Hers was a strong and noble Christian character, her home instincts

were strong, friendships circles was to her a large one and she ranked among us all as one of God's true gossamers. She is gone from our sight but because life and love are stronger than death, she is still our own for her angel spirit will be ever near.

Impressive funeral services were held from the home on Tuesday, May 4th, at 3:30, Rev. Walter E. Vater, the pastor, officiating, assisted by Rev. A. O. Birch-enough of St. Thomas, former pastor and friend of the family.

The choir sang with deep feeling her favorite hymns. There was a large number of friends present from all over the county and many from Grand Forks.

The casket was covered with a profusion of roses and lilies from friends and relatives.

Interment was made in the Bowesmont cemetery and the remains laid to rest by the side of her husband.
