Drowning at Letellier.

A drowning accident occurred at Letellier Sunday noon which resulted in four persons losing their lives. Those drowned were Mr. Misely and his five year old son, Thomas Bennell of Darlingford, Manitoba, and Miss Margurite Scott of Dominion City. Mrs. Misely, who was in the party, was rescued from the water and restored to life, being unconscious for over an hour after being taken from the Red.

The accident was a similar one to the one at Joliette several years ago when the Stuart family of Bowesmont lost their lives. Mr. Bennell was driving the car and he ran off the end of the ferry into twenty feet of water, the automobile making a complete somersault.

The body of Mr. Misely was recovered about seven o'clock in the evening and the others were not found until the next day.

Mr. Misely was a retired farmer and Mr. Bennell a store clerk while Miss Scott had been teaching school and was coming home to her parents at Dominion City for her summer vacation. The party was from Darlingford, a small town on the Manitoba and northwestern, ten miles north of Hannah, Cavalier county, and about forty miles west of Letellier.

The automobile was a Gray-Dort and was found to be in low gear when taken from the water which showed that the driver forgot himself and ran off the ferry. Had the chains on the end of the ferry been up the accident no doubt would have been averted, for everybody who were eye witnesses said he was driving slow. There were two other automobiles on the ferry when it happened.
