Word has been received from El Paso, Texas that Mrs. L. E. Booker died there a short time ago. Mrs. Booker was a sister of the late F. M. King of this place. Her husband was state treasurer of North Dakota at one time and one of the pioneers of Pembina. After he went south he accumulated a fortune in Mexican holdings but at the outbreak of hostilities in Mexico twelve years ago his property in that country was practically confiscated by the warring elements and Mr. Booker made his home in El Paso up to the time of his death three years ago. Their daughter, Blanche, is the only survivor of the L. E. Booker family. Their son, L. B., died a short time after they left this state.

Monday, October 25 next, has been named as the date on which the electors of Manitoba will vote for and against the importation of liquor into their province, under the amended Canadian Temperance act. The vote, it is provided, will be announced on Friday, Nov. 5 and in the event of the electors voting in favor of prohibition, the date of such prohibition going into effect will be set by order-in-council as provided in the act.

The law now on the statute books of the Dominion prohibits the importation of liquor into any province, except for the purposes permitted by the laws of the province. Thus, at present, liquor can be imported into Manitoba only for medicinal, sacramental, experimental or scientific purposes.

Women will vote on the prohibition referendum on an equal status with men. This will be the first time in the history of the province that all the women will have voted on a referendum.

The present laws in Manitoba are not meeting with favor with the masses as near as the Pioneer Express can learn. The opportunities for evading the intention of the law are so great that it is making criminals of many who otherwise were law abiding. The demand for liquor at fabulous prices on this side of the line has brought on extensive traffic in liquors between the two countries and arrests and convictions does not seem to have any effect. We look to see total prohibition carry.

MERIDIAN HIGHWAY

Officials Here.

John C. Nicholson, of Newton, Kansas and G. A. Macnaughton of San Marcos, Texas, president and secretary (treasurer, respectively, of the Meridian Highway, were in Pembina Tuesday on their way to Winnipeg, inspecting the road and meeting with interested parties generally on the road situation. They were a day ahead of schedule time when they arrived here.

The two gentlemen, one a lawyer and the other a newspaper man, are enthusiastic road builders and are spending time and money to promote this transcontinental highway. They report the southern half of the road as being taken care of better than through the two Dakotas. In South Dakota there are stretches where much work has been done.

The chief object of their visit this time was to see that the road will be properly marked for travel. In each town they arranged for temporary marking. Next season they expect to interest automobile and truck companies to take the matter up with suitable signs as they have done in many places.

The two gentlemen were met at Emerson by representatives of the Manitoba Good Roads Association and escorted north.
