GRAIN REPORTS.

George H. Moris threshed sixty-five acres of barley that went 37 bushels to the acre. His oats went 60 bushels, and both are good samples.

Several reports have come in that was 10 bushels to the acre and in two instances less. These low averages will bring down the averages of the county considerably, for there are many localities that do not turn out as well as around here.

E. Miron, twelve miles southwest of Pembina, threshed 20 bushels per acre of wheat from 140 acres of land, and what he sold he got dark Northern for. Mr. Miron has farmed the same place for forty-one years and never had a total failure. The nearest he came to a total loss was one time he was hit by hail. He is farming his half section with his youngest son.

Urgel Martel threshed 2,400 bushels of Dark Northern that went from 22 to 26 bushels. The Mararoni went 23 to 28 bushels and Marcus 22 to 26 bushels. Oats and barley went 25 bushels and a good quality. Three acres of oats in the bush went 160 bushels.
