Under Nestos Independent Administration
1—State hail warrants now sell for par and since present board arranged for sale owners have found better discount rate each month.
2—Farm loans are now being made under a strictly business basis, without regard to the political affiliations of the borrowers. The tax-payers are being protected.
3—The Nestos administration has started a movement to have this limit extended to twenty millions.
4—Work on the mill is now being rushed to completion by 250 workmen.
5—It is now being operated at a profit, disregarding previous losses.
6—The Home Builders Association is now being salvaged, in order to save the taxpayers as much money as possible under the conditions.
7—The Bank of North Dakota is now being used to help the various state industries in a strictly business like manner, and is liquidating itself over fifty per cent.
8—State bonds are now being purchased at a premium.
9—Money is again coming into the state, and the closed banks are being reopened.
10—The socialistic agitators have moved to Utah, California and other states, and North Dakota is again being governed by North Dakotans.

Under the Frazier League Administration
1—State hail warrants sold at a discount of 20 per cent, bringing but 80 per cent on the dollar, and were often impossible to sell.
2—Farm loans were being made to political friends, League organizers and to state officials. Less than one-third of the borrowers have kept up their payments.
3—Under the League administration the limit of farm loans was placed at ten million dollars.
4—Work on the Grand Forks Mill and Elevator had virtually stopped.
5—The mill at Drake was being operated at a big loss.
6—The Home Builders Association was being used to erect mansions for League officials at the expense of the tax-payers of the state.
7—The Bank of North Dakota was used to support the Nonpartisan League banks like the Scandinavian-American bank and thousands of dollars of the people's money was "frozen up" in poor paper.
8—State bonds could not be sold even at a discount.
9—Credit was being withdrawn from the state and scores of banks were closing their doors.
10—North Dakota was the refuge of hundreds of socialistic agitators and scores of non-residents were on the state pay roll.
