Notwithstanding the election of U. S. Senators of Illinois is cropping out and can not be shut up. Same thing down to Democratic Mississippi. We are coming to the Bryan idea of electing Senators by direct vote of the people, as we do our Governors, and its coming faster than some people are aware of.

The Republicans are breeding a peculiarity but very welcome bunch of outcasts these days. Reminds us of the time the Democrats had just previous to Bryan's first nomination to the Presidency. Last Tuesday night President Taft, Aldrich, Cannon and the best fighter ever were score at a monster meeting in the capital of Iowa. By whom? The State's two U. S. As the time for the primary election comes closer to hand, there is quite a hurry scurry among local candidates for the respective places on the county ticket, as well as for delegates to the various conventions. In the midst of it all, however, the district primary for member of Congress should not be lost sight of. This is the first opportunity the voters of the district have had to nominate a candidate for that office by direct primary, conducted at the expense of the State, and under the provisions of a rigid State statute. The matter is of sufficient importance to receive more than passing notice from the voters.

Remember, each voter is voting directly for his choice of candidate to fill the office. No delegates are to be chosen, and no convention to be held. Our local candidate for that office, Hon. A. C. Robeson, ought to receive

He raised money for an education by that time-worn expedient of teaching school; graduated from the Ohio Normal University; and later from the law school of the University of Michigan. Then he came to Lima thirteen years ago and began the practice of law, meanwhile acting for two terms as City Solicitor of Bluffton, where he was born and which his firm still represents as attorneys.

When the Spanish-American war arrived, Welty promptly enlisted as a private in Company C of the Second Ohio Volunteer Infantry. This business suited his fighting blood. He was commissioned as Commissary to his regiment, with the rank of Captain, and later became Chief Commissary of the State of Ohio, with the rank of Colonel.

Meanwhile, the peace having been declared with Spain, he returned to the legal field, where, as it developed, battles more strenuous than those of war, awaited him. But he has kept his military interests alive also.

In 1905 he was elected Prosecuting Attorney of Allen County by a majority of 3,000 greater than the low man on his ticket. He was immediately confronted by the strenuous life, which has continued to this hour.

When the South Side Bank of Lima failed, the president was arrested and testified that the cause of the downfall of his institution was the withdrawal of the county funds. He swore that he had paid five per cent on these deposits.

At that time Governor Frank T. Campbell was editor of this paper. His alert and far-seeing mind immediately caught the significance of this statement. This paper made such insistent demands for an investigation that suits were brought. The cases were contested with the utmost vigor, but Welty won in the end. The banks were compelled to pay interest on the money of the county deposited with them. The interest paid by these banks up to July of last year was over \$15,000.

The bank cases having been disposed of, and a new and valuable precedent as to payment for use of public money having been established, Mr. Welty turned his attention to the Bridge Trust and the Culvert Pipe Trust. About this period he also caused to be investigated the local lumber and plumbing combines. These were speedily dissolved. By this time, this staunch defender of the public weal had developed a goodly crop of enemies, but when he came up for his second term no one could be found to run against him in either party,
