To provide for the issuing of bonds of the Village of Celina in the sum of Twenty-two Thousand (\$22,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of paying for the purchase and payment of certain indebtedness, which, from its limits of taxation, said Village is unable to pay at maturity, there being declared and determined to be an existing, valid and binding obligation of said Village.

Section 1. That certain indebtedness heretofore incurred by the Village of Celina, to-wit: That incurred in the sale of bonds for the Village of Celina, Street Improvement; West Livingston Street Improvement; East Livingston Street Improvement; East Market Street Improvement; Main Street Improvement; West Market Street Improvement; and Highway Improvements, to the amount of Twenty-two Thousand (\$22,000.00) Dollars, is hereby declared and determined to be an existing, valid and binding obligation of said Village.

Section 2. To provide means to extend the time of payment of said indebtedness, which, from its limits of taxation, said Village is unable to pay at maturity, there shall be issued bonds of the Village of Celina to an aggregate amount of Twenty-two Thousand (\$22,000.00) Dollars, which bonds shall be in the denomination of Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars each, and numbered consecutively from 1 to 44, and shall be payable at the Treasurer's office, in the Village of Celina, State of Ohio, and shall bear interest at the rate of five (5) per cent per annum, payable annually at the same place.

Said bonds shall be dated March 1, 1913, and shall run for a period of 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28, 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, 34, 35, 36, 37, 38, 39, 40, 41, 42, 43, 44 years from their date, and shall be sold at public sale on the 14th day of January, 1913, at 10 o'clock a.m. at the Court-house of Mercer County, Ohio, and shall be sold to the highest bidder for cash.

Section 3.
