

ITALY'S FAMOUS IRON CROWN

Symbol of Royalty That Goes Far Back into the Records of European History.

One of the most famous crowns is that which is not bedecked with jewels, but is made of iron. This historic iron crown has played a romantic role in the history of Italy. It was fashioned in the year 591 by the command, it is said, of Theodora, the widow of a Lombard king, on the occasion of her marriage to a duke of Turin.

The iron is overlaid with gilt. The significance of the crown was supposed to lie in the fact that the weight of royalty could never be lightened by its splendid exterior. The iron of the inner portion was traditionally held to be one of the four nails used at the crucifixion.

For a long time the crown was kept in the famous monastery at Monza. In 774 it was brought forth to be placed upon the head of Charlemagne as "king of the Lombards," and on later occasions it figured in the triumphs of Frederic IV and Charles V. Finally, in the presence of all the representatives of state, the foreign envoys and princes and officers, Napoleon Bonaparte solemnly united it to the crown of France.

The crown belongs to the state, and the custodian of it is the legitimate representative of the republic of Monza. The title of "grand custodian," however, pertains to the head of the Order of Cavaliers.

Woman's Press Club.

Cure for Blindness. In certain forms of blindness caused by opacity of the cornea it has been discovered that the best form of treatment is a tattooing process. For this operation ordinary India ink is used. The tattooing being done with a hypodermic needle.

The cornea is injected with the ink by repeated punctures, so that when the operation is completed the cornea is apparently completely blackened. But during the process of absorption of the ink particles that follows, the original capacity is also absorbed, the cornea becomes clear and sight is restored.
