TEACHERS PLEASSED WITH NEW LAW

[By S. Cotterman, County Supt.] The district superintendents, all of whom were present, held their regular meeting at the county superintendent's office on February 5, beginning at 1 p. m.

In response to a question sent out by State Superintendent Miller, a report of the work in Mercer County under the new school law was given, and statistics compiled with reference to the supply of teachers for next year.

The Fair Board visited the meeting and discussed plans for holding junior contests at the county fair. It was decided to provide stock-judging contests for the boys, and contests in baking, sewing and canning for the girls.

Other topics discussed by the superintendents were as follows: Results of the mid-year examinations, program for the annual board members meeting, uniform text-book, and method readers, and a State Course of study.

In regard to work under the new system, all expressed themselves well pleased and hoped that no changes would be made in the essential features of the law.

The results of the examinations were, on the whole, satisfactory; so, with slight changes, it was agreed to follow the same plans in the final examinations.

An interesting list of topics was prepared for the board members at their meeting of February 20, a full program of which will appear later.

As to text-books, the sentiment was against compulsory county uniformity, and favored the idea of letting the county and district superintendents of the various counties work out a uniform system of text-books and courses of study when convenient and justified.


