Indictments the Grist of Grand Jury for April Term

Of Three Made Public, Two Are for Toting Guns, and One for Attempted Rape.

Three public and one secret indictment were returned by the Grand Jury of the April term of Common Pleas Court in their report made to Judge Miller about half past four on Wednesday afternoon.

The jury was in session since Monday morning. During the time thirty-three witnesses were examined, covering eleven cases. Four true bills or indictments were returned and seven cases ignored. The jury also made the accustomed visit to the jail. They reported things O. K. in Sheriff Pumphrey's keeping but made several recommendations for improvements in the interior of the jail.

The list of grand jurors serving was the same as the previously published list, excepting E. E. Garwick, of Center township. He was excused from service by the court and Sheriff Pumphrey filled the panel with Phillip Beiersdorfer, of this city.

The three indictments made public are as follows: Charles Mallow, Rockford, carrying concealed weapons.

Earl Rybolt, Washington township, carrying concealed weapons. Clement Harden, Ft. Recovery, assault with intent to commit rape upon one Francis Schuch.

Harden and Rybolt were unable to furnish bond and are boarding with Sheriff Pumphrey.

The fourth indictment is on a local case, but the party had not been apprehended up to the time of going to press.

The prisoners will be arraigned before Common Pleas Judge Miller tomorrow (Saturday) morning. The jury was finally discharged by Judge Miller after making their report.

The case of S. K. Copeland vs. The Citizens Banking Co. was heard on demurrer Wednesday morning by Common Pleas Judge Miller and taken under advisement.

The case of Clara Caldwell vs. The Industrial Commission of Ohio was submitted to Judge Miller, Wednesday.

Judge Miller, on Wednesday re-appointed J. W. Riley, John A. Doner and D. H. Robison as members of the Soldiers' Relief Commission.

The farmer is the biggest stock holder in good roads. His products must reach the markets. The shop and factory man is located on railroads and they have no trouble to transport their wares and products. The factory man would go bankrupt if he had to be a slave to bad roads to the extent that farmers are. Think of tomorrow in road building.—Ottawa Sentinel.

HUNT

For Personal Property Will Begin Next Monday

When Newly Elected and Appointed Assessors Will Meet for Final Instructions.

Next Monday morning the assessors elected last November and those appointed since to fill vacancies will meet at the Auditor's office to receive their supplies and instructions for listing personal property.

This year the taxing machinery reverts from the Tax Commissioner back to the Auditor and the work of the assessors will therefore be under direction of County Auditor Steinbrunner.

Owing to a misunderstanding of the new law providing for the election of assessors, one for each township and one for each corporation of the county, in several townships, divided into two or more voting precincts, more than one assessor was elected. Because of this condition neither could serve and Auditor Steinbrunner found it necessary to make appointments in several townships. He also appointed T. J. Blake to fill a vacancy in the third Ward caused by the removal from that ward of the elected assessor, P. A. Ellis.

Do not delay your returns as their time is limited, the fellow with the biggest job being compelled to report no later than June 5. Mrs. Wm. Roettger Dead at New Bremen—Former Rockford Lady Dies in California.

Joseph W. Burris, aged 77 years, the venerable father of Abe Burris, West Market street, died Wednesday morning at his home in Washington township. Death was due to infirmities of old age. He had been ailing since last November, and was bedfast for three weeks prior to his death.

Deceased was born in Jay county, Indiana, August 24, 1838. He came to this county, with his parents, when a boy, locating in Washington township where he always resided. He was united in marriage to Rhoads Christian in August 1860, and she with six children survive: Mrs. Catherine Stettler, of Hopewell township; Abe Burris, of this city; Mrs. Lena Bryley and Leonard Burris, of Washington township; Shell Burris, of Muncie, Ind., and Mrs. Robert Mead, of Paulding county.

Funeral services will be held at Swamp College this morning, with Rev. F. P. Cordier in charge.

Mrs. Mary Springer, a former resident of this county, died on March 30th, at the home of her daughter at Alhambra, Calif., following a lingering illness. She went to California to live with her daughter three years ago. Six children survive. The remains were shipped to Rockford last Monday and removed to the home of her son, Lorin C. Springer. Funeral services were held at the Presbyterian church at Rockford last Tuesday afternoon.

Improvements in East Jefferson Deemed Necessary

Hearing of Zenz Road Improvement May 19—Rockford Gets Another Paved Road.

The Boards of Mercer and Auglaize meeting in joint session on the joint county ditch improvement, petitioned for by John H. Blase et al, ordered the work sold on April 8 at 10 a. m. The work will be sold at public outcry by the joint county surveyor, F. C. Keuthan, at the surveyor's office, Wapakoneta.

The Board on last Thursday went upon the line of the proposed Dibble road improvement in Jefferson township and determined the necessity thereof. The route of the proposed improvement is as follows: Beginning at a point on the section line between Sections 3 and 4, Jefferson township, where said section line is crossed by the Celina-St. Marys pike; thence north following said public road to the northwest corner of Section 34, same township, to a point where said public road crosses the Copeland pike and there terminate.

They also viewed the route of the proposed Huffman road also in East Jefferson and determined the necessity thereof. The route said proposed improvement is as follows: Beginning at a point on the Celina-St. Marys pike, on the section line between Sections 2 and 3, Jefferson township;
