BUCKEYE NEWS NOTES

MATTERS OF GENERAL INTEREST TO RESIDENTS OF OHIO.

Convicted of Murder. Columbus, March 9.—William Wright, negro, charged with the murder of Detective William O'Rourke, will explain his crime by death in the electric chair.

Croxtan's Aim. Columbus, March 11.—Sending of untrained boys to the farm would reduce rather than increase agricultural output, in the opinion of Fred C. Croxtan, chairman of the labor and industry committee of the Ohio defense council.

Funds Transferred. Columbus, March 12.—The only immediate cause for which a special session of the general assembly might have been called were removed when the board of control, which has charge of the transfer of department funds, unanimously voted to technically violate the law and transfer funds from "improvements" to "maintenance" for the 22 institutions under the board of administration.

Auto Driver Sent Up. Columbus, March 12.—Raymond Cooke, 21, sentenced to the Mansfield reformatory for manslaughter, is the first Franklin county man sent up to serve a sentence for homicide resulting from an automobile mishap.

Policeman Killed; Suspects Removed. Akron, O., March 13.—Fearing mob violence, Frank Mazzano and Paul Chivoro, arrested here, charged with shooting and killing Patrolman Goth in G. Richards, were taken to Cleveland for safekeeping.

Springhouse Partially Destroyed. Springfield, O., March 13.—Clark county's courthouse, which it is believed will cost \$500,000 to replace, is in ruins as a result of fire, which practically destroyed the building.

Oil Expert Dead. Cleveland, March 11.—Charles C. Duffield, 50, who is said to have compiled the first oil report ever published, is dead. Duffield is said to have obtained the figures for the report by means of a canoe trip up the Allegheny river and Oil creek.

Breaks Through the Ice. Marion, O., March 12.—James Walsh Jr., 10, was drowned in a lake at Marion cemetery when he ventured on the thin ice to get a dead fish.

Stepmother Sentenced. Marion, O., March 11.—Prosecuted by the Marion county humane society for whipping her 4-year-old stepdaughter with a razor strap, Mrs. Goldie Kline, 30, was sentenced to three months in the Dayton workhouse by Mayor Sautter.

Fix Prices of Spuds. Cleveland, March 13.—A price of from 50 cents to \$1.25 per bushel was set by the county food administration in its bulletins for potatoes.

The British front in Flanders was the chief field of military operations on the west front. Passing from the stage of trench raiding, the fighting in this area now has entered upon a more active phase.

Activity continued on the American front. Northwest of Toul a German patrol was driven off largely through the vigilance and promptness to open fire of an American sentry.

Reports from Sweden say that a force of German infantry and artillery has invaded Finland, landing at Abo from the Aland islands.

A Paris dispatch, dated March 11, stated that three savage raids on the German lines, on the Lorraine front, were made by the Americans, who succeeded in reaching the second line of the enemy trenches before they were ordered to return.

Brazilian government has taken over the Santa Catharina railway, built by German capital.

Henry Ford will build a second shipbuilding plant near New York, N. J., to produce submarine destroyers.

W. A. Shryver of Detroit, Mich., a writer for business publications, was killed in an automobile accident while on a visit to Kilauea volcano on the island of Hawaii.

Canada, except the provinces of Quebec and Ontario, will go dry April 1. On Dec. 31 the oasis in Quebec and Ontario will vanish and the sale and manufacture of liquor will be abolished throughout the dominion.

Workman Electrocuted. Columbus, March 12.—J. D. McFarlin, a painter, came in contact with a live wire at the Columbus Railway-Light power house and received burns that caused his death.

Germany's War Debt. London, March 13.—A new German war loan of \$3,750,000,000 will be issued soon, a dispatch from Copenhagen says.

Not Guilty of Arson. Cambridge, O., March 11.—William McManus was found not guilty of arson. McManus was proprietor of a restaurant which was destroyed by fire Oct. 15.

City Full of Speakabouts as Well as Licensed Saloons. Akron, O.—This city is full of licensed saloons. This means, according to wet claims, that there are no speakabouts here.

The supplementary rules recently issued by the United States Food Administration fixed the maximum allowable handling margins, per ton, carlot basis, as follows:

Forty-five boys and girls of the Elk River (Minn.) high school are on a strike against German being taught in the school.

Body of William S. Kugger, soldier, was found on the railroad track at Huntington, W. Va. Police believe he fell from a troop train.

Victor J. Dewees, Romborough, Pa., was killed in a friendly boxing match with Charles G. Swann, another soldier, at Camp Meade, Md.

Cadet Burton Hulbert, 19, Ottawa, Ont., of the Canadian flying corps, was killed when his airplane fell at Benbrook field, near Fort Worth, Tex.

John McCormack is \$64,000 poorer, having paid his income tax in New York. The Irish tenor made a hurried trip from the west to settle with Uncle Sam.

Immigrant quarters at Ellis Island were converted to the use of wounded soldiers and sailors following an agreement between the navy, war and labor departments.

Captain A. H. Innis, Hampton, Va., was found dead in a Baltimore hotel. Senator Tillman of South Carolina announced his candidacy for a fifth term.

John J. Scannell, 78, former Tammany leader, died in New York of pneumonia.

Los Angeles board of education barred debates on peace topics in high and elementary schools.
