POLICE ITEMS.—The following cases were disposed of in the Mayor's Court this morning: J. Haley, for being drunk and disorderly, was "hauled in" on the charge, and it being his first offense, was let off by depositing the moderate sum of \$7.70 for the benefit of the City.

J. Finch was brought up on charge of being drunk, and very sleepy. The Police not being authorized to contract for beds in the public highway, offered him accommodations at the Station, and this morning, he was referred to His Honor, the Mayor, to settle for his lodgings. It being the first offense, he was assessed in the moderate sum of \$7.70, which he paid, and went on his way rejoicing.

Wm. H. Sroufe, was examined on the charge of helping himself to the amount of \$20, the property belonging legally to another party. The testimony in this case, was rather conflicting, and the defendant will be held to answer in the sum of \$100, unless he answers to the plea of "guilty."

Yesterday a man and his daughter applied for a warrant for the arrest of a man whom they charged with attempting to commit a rape upon the child. The warrant was placed in the hands of the officials, and the offender was arrested and lodged in jail. The case will be brought up for trial, Thursday morning, at 10 o'clock.

There is just now, a warm controversy going on, on the subject of the annexation of Miami City to the City of Dayton. The financial question seems to be the bone of contention between the disputants, and for the purpose of setting at rest now and forever, that issue, we reproduce the ever memorable and prophetic saying of the "Sainted Abe." We think it covers the whole ground. And besides there is a "loyal" twang about it that denotes its genuine origin. We have read many treatises on financial matters, and have carefully noted the late reported talk of Andy on the possibility of repudiation. But nowhere have we come across the sturdy chunks of wisdom displayed by the "lamented" Abraham. We commend it to the controversialists, on the financial aspect of the annexation question. And so far as we are individually concerned we intend to act on the maxims laid down by the "sainted dead."

The Newcomers.—This inimitable troupe will give an exhibition at the Opera House this evening. W. W. Newcomb, proprietor, has attained a reputation in the minstrel line that places him at the head of the list, and we have no hesitation in saying that the exhibition at the Opera House to-night will exceed anything of the kind witnessed in Dayton since the last visit of the Newcomers.

The Detroit Press speaking of this troupe says "The Newcomers gave their first entertainment last evening to one of the fullest houses of the season. The hall was packed to the door, as is generally the case when companies of a first-class reputation are announced to appear. The performances did not disappoint the audience, originally being a special feature throughout. The selections were beautifully rendered. In the vocal department, the ballad of Mr. Rainer, "This only a withered rose," was especially deserving of mention, the vocalist's full, rich baritone filling the hall with splendid melody.

The veteran comedian, W. W. Newcomb, received a hearty welcome back after an absence of two years from the stage. Himself, Arlington and Billy Emerson are "murderous"; they did not show any mercy whatever on the audience, for as soon as they (the audience) recover from one convulsion, they would send them off in another spasm.

"Billy Emerson's song and dance is a great feature. During the act the house is still as death, but when it is over one has to stop up their ears if they wish to hear again for the next half hour. They have

ANNEXATION QUESTION.

At the ensuing municipal election, the question is to be determined by the voters of Dayton whether Miami City shall be annexed to Dayton or not, which is certainly of sufficient interest to all concerned to demand of them a careful investigation of the question so to be determined. It is rumored that in the eastern part of the city, some persons, who can see no further than the precincts of their own locality, oppose the annexation for the selfish reason that in their own opinion it will increase their taxes to improve Miami City without any local benefit to themselves. As well might the occupants of the original limit of Dayton have opposed the annexation of the east part. It would at least have been as generous and quite as wise.

But let it be understood that the citizens of Miami City do not ask to be admitted for the purpose of having their streets graded and graveled, &c., at the expense of the city, but if at some future time they demand an unnecessary expenditure of public treasure, do the citizens of Dayton fear that two Councilmen (all that by the present statute they are entitled to) will overpower or outgeneral the sixteen City Fathers of Dayton? Certainly not. What then is to be feared? I answer nothing but egotism. It is well known that the public schools in Miami City, are in disfavor and only kept open a few months in each year, not for the want of ability of its citizens, but for the want of a proper educational spirit of its managers as is usual in small villages, and for this reason (which is the sole one) they have asked annexation that an experienced Board of Directors may manage their schools, and thereby elevate them to a proper standard.

This may truthfully be said to have been created; with but few exceptions, the entire little objection made by the anti-free-schoolmen in Miami City. The same spirit was prevalent when our free school system was first introduced, and with no other result, to wit: to spit its venomous opposition at every effort that may be made to raise the free schools to their proper standard. Miami City has its school-houses already built; all they ask is an efficient modus operandi which they confidently expect by annexation to Dayton.

Will the voters of Dayton let the children of the poor, of Miami City, be deprived of an education while there is sufficient available means in Miami City to do it. Again, is it not to the benefit of every business and laboring man in Dayton to increase her population. It may be said, "What is there in that strange spell, a name?" In answer, there is force in numbers. The greater the population a city is reported to have, the greater will be the influx of trade. This is self-evident to all, and too plain to argue, and has been so well understood that the Legislature has found it necessary to restrain, by certain restrictions, cities from inclosing in their limits contiguous territory without approval.

Mr. Editor:—The annexation of Miami City may prove a vexatious question to the voters, and as no little whisky may be spilt, not to say blood, I propose to offer a high authority bearing upon the decision of this controversy. No less than the opinion of the citizen who gave that place its present pretentious name. Without much promising, however, Mr. Editor, would that town not lose its individuality by incorporation with Dayton—as the less always swallows the greater. Upon the hypothesis that newspapers—advertisements and all—generally aim at truth, I proceed to quote from the annals of the past:

"A PLEASANT HOME IN A PLEASANT PLACE." "Miami City is one of the most beautiful and healthful localities in the Miami Valley, for a retired and quiet home. It is separated from the City of Dayton on the West, by the Great Miami River, and covers an area of three square miles. The growth is healthful and energetic, promising much in the future, and good houses with all good improvements are constantly going on. Miami City is beautifully laid out, with ample parks, covered with native forest trees, and broad streets, and alleys—streets from 60 to 130 feet wide, and numerous read alleys. In some of our plots the streets and alleys occupy as much ground as the lots."

Now mark the main point: "Whoever loves good society, good neighborhood, schools, churches, &c., can be fully gratified in a home in Miami City. Tipping shops and rowdy boys live on the other side of the river. The present is a favored time for all who would make for themselves a pleasant home in a pleasant place. A home where one would not only love to live, but love to die, when the inevitable hour shall have come. The undersigned is offering lots, &c. &c."

Here follows details of the ruinous prices asked for the lots. "At these prices," he resumes, "and on such terms who is so poor as not to be able to buy a lot? Who will not have a house where every tree, flower and shrub planted, and every improvement made, he can call his own? Who would not rather be sheltered beneath the canopy of his own cottage than be the tenant of another, however palatial the mansion? Reader, come and make yourself a pleasant home in a pleasant place."

This is history, Mr. Editor, and we must believe it, and as surely as Dayton absorbs Miami City, so surely will it lose all these attractions of a "Pleasant Place." What the writer says above, about it being a pleasant place to die in, is open to argument. So far as my knowledge goes none of the afore-said dead have ever reported back unless the spiritualists found the reports. There might be perhaps some better place to die in, not far from Miami City. You can die higher, drier and quieter in Dayton view; whether pleasant, is the question. This is not grammatical, but never mind. The historical reference would seem to be conclusive and final. Will you annihilate this lovely suburb in a trice. I started with the hypothesis that the founder of Miami City fairly presented its advantages as they existed years ago and time has not impaired them. Dayton will require a deer park one of these days as well as better lungs than she has now, then we'll all go over there to breathe.
