Amie Downey's Murderer. Charles Chortson, aged twenty-seven, has been arrested in New York, charged with the brutal murder of Amie Downey.

Up in Maine. The dispatches state that seven of the Patriots in Maine have taken their seats in the Senate and twenty-two in the House.

Tom Paine's Birthday Anniversary. The 143rd anniversary of the birthday of Thomas Paine, (Jan. 29), was generally celebrated throughout the country by the Liberals.

All is Love. The nominations published as recently made by the President for foreign missions have been confirmed by the Senate.

Labor Troubles. At the Pittsburg mine the strike is said to be practically over. The miners have resumed work at three and a half cents on the barrel.

Something Loose. Dispatches from Havana for the past week announce the cessation of hostilities on the part of the rebels. Evidently some thing is going to happen.

Thoughtful Man. The murderer of Geo. Beard, at Farmington, Mo., has asked the Sheriff of Carny a painful duty. He was found hanging by the neck in his cell.

Railroad Consolidation. It is reported that the Union Pacific, Kansas Pacific and Denver Pacific Railroad Companies have consolidated, and will be known hereafter as the Union Pacific Railroad Company.

Greenfield, convicted of wife-murder at Syracuse, N. Y., has received a second reprieve, the date now fixed for his execution being February 27.

Diagnosed. The jury in the case of Chas. Desmond, the doctoring of a man, at Massachusetts Home Missionary Society, has failed to agree and been discharged.

The Town of Big Feet. A private dispatch from Washington says that the Congressional appropriation of \$250,000 for the Chicago harbor will undoubtedly go through.

Arkansas Silver. Steps are being taken by leading citizens of St. Louis to develop the silver resources of Montgomery County in Arkansas. These mines are pronounced quite valuable by mining experts.

Swarming North. Intelligence from St. Louis says that the negro exodus has just received a new impetus. They are arriving by the hundreds, bound for Kansas, and applying to the Relief Committee of that city for food and other necessities.

Terrible Loss. Dispatches have been received from Odessa containing a rumor that a Russian transport vessel, with 2,000 troops aboard, had been wrecked in the Caspian Sea, and most, if not all, the soldiers perished.

These Things Will Occur. A Berlin dispatch says that a fire damp explosion has occurred in a colliery at Meissen, Saxony. Ten of the dead and wounded have been taken out of the pit. It is believed there are five corpses still in the pit.

Beaumont's Object. A sensational report comes from England that if Earl Beaumont is sustained in his policy, England, France and Germany contemplate an alliance against the United States, and that the project of the Isthmian Canal will bring about the close of the world.

Davis and Brennan. Reports from New York say that the people of County Mayo have decided to elect to the field, Michael Davis and Thos. Brennan, as candidates of the County for Parliament; upon condition they do not take their seats if elected.
