**COMMITTED!**  
**The Coroner's Verdict in the Beall Tragedy!**  
Coroner Dr. C. C. Jones closed his inquest on the Beall murder Thursday afternoon last, and Friday morning rendered the following verdict:  
"To find the deceased, Mrs. Nancy G. Beall, came to her death by pistol-shot wounds through the brain, one shot entering the temporal bone on the left side, just back of the left eye, and the other on the opposite side; the other shot being an inch or an inch and a half back of the one described, and making it enter the outer angle of the orbit on the right side. Also, two wounds on the back of the neck, between the head and shoulders, completely severing the spinal column, either of said wounds being sufficient to cause death. Further find that while it seems almost impossible to conceive that one so young, and especially a son, could commit such an atrocious crime, yet the evidence presented and the circumstances surrounding the case are so strong that I feel warranted in fixing the crime on John A. Beall."  
On the rendering of the verdict Marshal Corwin filed an affidavit before Mayor Marsh, and a warrant was issued for the arrest of the boy, who was in Eaton at the residence of his aunt, Miss Hannah Gard. He was taken before the Mayor, examination waived and he was committed without bail. In his arrest and incarceration he exhibited the same stolid indifference that characterized him throughout the inquest and at the funeral of his mother. He admitted that when he closed his eyes to sleep, visions of his murdered mother in her struggle to raise her head was before him, and he heard her screams as when she was shot. When he was assigned to his cell he expressed a desire that the doors all be kept locked so that no one could get to him, and his father requested that no one be allowed to talk to him, and asked the privilege of sleeping with him at night, but was refused. Deputy Sheriff John Peters slept with him the first night, but since he has been alone. He remarked to the deputy sheriff on the first night, that the days were long and the nights lonesome, and said he did not like to look out of his cell window facing the west, because there was so many persons standing around looking up at him. His father, sister and aunt visit him daily. He talks readily and cheerfully, and his composure and nerve under the circumstances is surprising, and up to the present writing he exhibits no signs of a confession, but on the contrary asserts his innocence. It is certainly the most singular case of crime on record.  
At the discovery of the crime, and up to the time of the testimony of the daughter, public opinion was very strong that the father of the boy was in some way connected with it. But the declarations of the daughter before the coroner, that herself and father got into the vehicle together—that her mother stood in the door of the house and waved her hand as they passed out into the road that leads to the pike, and that her father did not leave the vehicle until they reached town—has to a considerable extent changed that opinion and settled it to the belief that the individual named in this column is the guilty party over the words himself and mother had about the hitching of the horse, committed the horrible deed, and there it must remain until he confesses or the case is tried before our court of justice in November next.  
Groups of men, women and children continually loiter around the outside of the prison to catch a glimpse of the young matricide, and the Sheriff is daily importuned by parties for admission to see him. No persons are admitted to his presence, however, except the inmates of the prison, and they only when accompanied by the Sheriff or his deputy, which rule is right and proper and should be rigidly enforced.  
**Court of Common Pleas.**  
Court is progressing slowly. Judge Vanderveer found that the cases were too much crowded last week, and two jury cases were reassigned about on week ahead. The following is a synopsis of the business disposed of as it appears upon the journal:  
Geo. W. Parks vs. Carey Toney. Motion to strike out a part of the answer sustained.  
M. M. Barnett vs. F. A. Pierce. Jas. Pottinger was made a defendant with leave to file pleadings.  
W. C. Darragh vs. Joseph Farney. Motion for diminution of record withdrawn. Leave given to answer.  
Ohio Farmers Ins. Co. vs. Jesse Brown. The terms of sale not having been complied with, the sale heretofore made was set aside and new sale ordered.  
Susan Dunham vs. Reuben Brubaker et al. Judgment by default, \$71.10.  
Albert Dietrich vs. Sarah Kutz. Suit on a Bohemian note. Tried to jury. The jury wrestled with the case two days and failed to agree.  
O. W. Tooley vs. Wm. House. Libel case. Tried to jury. The court rendered a decision in favor of the plaintiff's evidence, and dismissed the case.  
Adena Brown vs. B. A. Blain, Adm'r. Tried to jury. After the plaintiff closed her testimony, the defendant took leave to amend his answer. This was a continuance of the case at defendant's cost.  
E. A. Kennespohl vs. Nathan Overpeck. Demurrer to petition sustained.  
I. E. Freeman et al. vs. Jennie Taylor. Judgment on default, \$233.67.  
C. G. Gray et al. vs. J. M. Van Aunsal. This case was partly submitted to a jury when court adjourned Friday evening, until Tuesday.  
State vs. Richard Morrow. Assault and battery. Defendant gave bond for his appearance, and was afterwards arraigned and entered his plea of "not guilty."  
State vs. Buckner Deem. Killing fish. Plea "guilty." Fine \$25 and costs.  
State vs. Harvey Deem. Same offense. Nolle.  
State vs. Wm. Eakes and Cassius Eakes. Defendants arraigned and entered plea of "not guilty."  
The only criminal cases assigned for trial are the two Lock cases and the two Eakes' cases. They are both set for trial Tuesday, June 21st.
