States' News.

INSTRUCTION IN A JAIL.—We are informed by the Ohio "Statesman" that the prisoners in the jail of Franklin County made a bold effort to escape on Tuesday afternoon last. When the jailer (Davis) requested them to return to their cells after dinner they displayed brick-bats, taken from the walls, and one fellow said they had concluded not to obey his commands, and that if he attempted to enforce them they would give him his quietus. For an instant matters looked rather ominous to the jailer, who was alone among the score of prisoners, who were awaiting confinement.

STATE BANDS' CONVENTION.—A preliminary meeting of some of the Ohio bands took place at Ashland some days since, at which it was resolved, that a State Band Convention be held in the city of Mansfield, Ohio, on the last Thursday (26th) of May, 1859.

Subsequently a circular was published, from which we learn that F. Ohlenhausen, of Wooster, is the President, and James H. Hamman, of Mansfield, the Corresponding Secretary. After calling on the bands throughout the State to lend their prompt and hearty co-operation to "this enterprise," the circular proceeds to describe in what the exercises and festivities of the convention day shall consist, viz: a grand parade, preceded by the bands, and a grand concert by all the bands—the day to close with a grand torchlight procession, consisting of the bands, firemen, military and citizens of Mansfield. The bands present and playing for the prizes will be divided into three classes, as follows: The first class will consist of bands having been in existence two years and over; the second class will consist of bands from one to two years of age; and the third class, of bands playing less than one year. Each class will be entitled to three prizes in cash.

The circular further states, that the ladies will present a beautiful flag, the bands that the railroads will carry those who attend the festivities for half-fare; that suitable stages will be erected for the bands to play upon, and one grand stage will be erected for all the bands to play upon in concert; that the President will furnish all the bands with four pieces of music intended to be played by all the bands together, and that interested judges will be in attendance to award the prizes.

We understand that the preparations making for the occasion are on a scale of "grand magnificence." The Secretary courts letters of inquiry.

VIRGINIA ORATORS.—It is not a little singular, writes the Wheeling "Times," that Virginia furnished nearly all the orators for the various celebrations of the 22d of February in New York. Besides Mr. Bots, there were Colonel Peyton, our glorious candidate for Lieutenant-governor. A letter from New York says: "Col. Wm. M. Peyton and Walter Preston, Esq., electrified the audience at the great Fair entertainment. Mr. Preston's speech was a brilliant piece of oratory, sparkling all over with diamonds of the first water. Col. Peyton, who ranks very high for talent, was fully up to his reputation. He was enlarged in his views, forcible, clear as light itself, and often overwhelmingly eloquent. Virginia has reason to be proud of her sons. Bots, Peyton and Preston make a trio that will bear comparison with any men in this city, or elsewhere. Hurrah, I repeat, for Old Virginia!"

THE COUSIN ROBERT.—A meeting was held at Coshocton, on Saturday last, for the object of eliciting public opinion as to the recent robbery of the treasury. It will be remembered that on the 21st of January the treasurer, Mr. Samuel Ketchum, was assaulted and so overpowered that he could not prevent the robbery of \$22,000 of the public money; it will also be remembered that the Supreme Court has decided that the treasurer and his sureties are liable for the amount so taken. In view of these facts the meeting passed the following resolutions: That we believe it would be improper and unmerciful for the people, or their authorities, to exact from Mr. Ketchum the payment of the amount of the amount of which the treasury was robbed; and, 2d: That we recommend the Legislature of Ohio and the Commissioners of Coshocton County to take such steps as may be necessary to relieve Mr. Ketchum and his sureties from the legal responsibility resting upon them.

HON. E. A. HANNEGAN.—Quite a large number of persons assembled yesterday afternoon at the Episcopal Church, on the corner of Fifth and Chestnut streets, to perform the last sad rites to the illustrious dead. All that was mortal of the late Hon. E. A. Hannegan, was conveyed to the Church in time to give all the friends an opportunity of viewing the remains of the deceased. The funeral ceremonies were conducted by the Rev. Dr. Sawyer, assisted by another clergyman, whose name we did not learn, and were of the most solemn and impressive character. At the close the pall bearers, eight in number, conveyed the coffin to the hearse, and the funeral cortege moved up Fifth street toward the Bellefontaine Cemetery. The following distinguished gentlemen acted as pall bearers: Kenneth McKenzie, Judge Bates, Judge Woods, Colonel J. C. Brant, Commodore Ramsey, Uriel Wright, O. C. Cates, Col. A. D. Stewart. A majority of the members of the bar were present at the service and accompanied the procession to the grave.—Missouri Democrat, March 1.

THE BROOKLYN (N. Y.) DEFEALCATION.—There have been no tidings as yet of the defaulting teller of the Atlantic Bank, Oscar E. Field, but it is supposed by those who are most likely to know, that he is within a few days' distance of the city, and could be found, were it not for a lack in the organ of secretiveness in some of those most familiar with the concerns of the institution. It is now beyond a doubt, beyond a certainty, that the amount of the defalcation will exceed \$50,000, instead of falling short of these figures. The gambling operations of the defaulter have been known to "men about town" for at least two years, but his employers knew nothing about it; and his absconding date back about the same length of time, but so nicely was it accomplished that not the least suspicion was aroused by the parties most interested. The amount of funds taken from the safe on the day of his flight is from \$7,000 to \$9,000, in specie and bills of different banks, so that he will have sufficient funds to carry him almost any distance.
