ACCIDENT to a DECK-HAND.—A deck-hand on one of the steamers at the wharf, on Sunday last, fell into the hold of a boat, which he was assisting to load, and broke one of his legs. He was taken to the Commercial Hospital, where his wounds were dressed and his wants cared for.

LADIES' FAIR.—The ladies of the First Presbyterian Church hold their annual fair and supper, for mission purposes, in the basement to their church, on Fourth street, on Thursday, the 17th inst. The sale will commence at ten o'clock in the morning, and supper at seven in the evening. Tickets \$1.

PASSING COUNTERFEIT MONEY.—A fellow named Jacob Brasher, was arrested, yesterday, in the act of passing a twenty dollar counterfeit bill in exchange for a couple of watches, which he had bought at some store on Broadway, near the Spencer House. He will have a hearing this morning.

SELLING THE PROPERTY OF ANOTHER.—A man named George Hall, was arraigned before Justice Getzendanner, on Saturday, charged, by a Mr. Asa A. Flint, with selling a tract of land in Breckinridge County, Kentucky, worth \$2,500, for which he had no legal title. The case has not yet been concluded.

SERIOUS FIGHT.—A serious fight occurred yesterday afternoon, in which four men—two of whom, James Gallagher and Robert McFall, were arrested—fell upon and beat another, whose name we could not learn, injuring him quite severely. Those we have named will have a hearing before Judge Pruden this morning, upon a charge of assault and battery with intent to kill.

THE RACE STREET MURDER.—Mary Simpson alias Lavina Long and Julia Burns—wife of Burns, the man condemned for the murder of Michael Burke—charged, in connection with Laurence Duncan, Peter Conklin and Charles B. Cassidy, with the murder of John Gilliam, which took place a few nights ago, on Race street, will have a hearing this morning before the Police Court.

BURGLARY.—The house of a man named James, located at the base of Mount Adams, was burglariously entered night before last, and some male and female wearing apparel stolen, together with some books, the whole amounting to about \$25 or \$30. It is supposed the scoundrels got into the house by climbing to the roof with a ladder and passing through a trap-door.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT.—A man named Samuel Garvin, a laborer at the Landing, was seriously burnt, in consequence of the breaking of a car-boy of vitriol, which he was carrying at the time of the accident on his shoulder. The liquid ran over his neck, face and breast, causing a frightful and painful wound, which was dressed at the Commercial Hospital, to which the poor fellow was taken in an extremely exhausted condition.

FALL OF A HOUSE.—A small frame house, evidently built upon the sand, situated at the corner of Third street and the Miami Canal, and occupied as an office by Isaac Gravenon & Co., the proprietors of the Cincinnati Stone Works, fell into the canal about noon Saturday, a distance of twenty-five or thirty feet, and alighted roof downward. The office was empty at the time, and consequently the accident was of less moment than it would otherwise have been. The late high water is said to have been the principal cause of the fall.

FIRE ON WESTERN ROW.—About ten o'clock, Saturday morning, a fire broke out in a small frame building, which was vacant, but had formerly been occupied by William Davis, as a box factory, and which was located on Western Row, near Twelfth street. It was the property of a Mr. Clagstone, who, we believe, resides in St. Louis, and was entirely destroyed. The flames were communicated to a coal-yard, which was upon one side of the tenement, and a wood-yard upon the other, both of which were damaged to some extent; but the entire loss will not exceed \$500 or \$600.

CITY COUNCIL.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE SPECIAL MEETING OF SATURDAY NIGHT.

In accordance with a call, which had been issued and signed by Messrs. Kierstedt, Bunyan, Schaffer and Niles, a special meeting of the City Council was held on Saturday night for the purpose of hearing reports from the Committee on Public Landings and Improvements, and to transact such other business as might be presented.

The following resolution, in regard to the extension of the power of the Judge of the Police Court, was offered by Mr. Bates, and, after some discussion, adopted:

Resolved, That our members in the Ohio State Senate be requested to use all their influence to procure the passage of the bill that passed this Council, giving the Police Judge the power to sentence prisoners to hard labor, which has already passed the Lower House.

The secondary parts, chorus, orchestra, etc., are from the Academy of Music of New York, while the whole is under the immediate direction of Mr. Strakosch.
