AN additional report was made to the Court of Common Pleas by the Jailor, yesterday morning, stating that he had received into his custody five persons since the report made on the previous day.

Four of these were charged with having been engaged in the late Race street murder, and one with burglary.

OFFICE OF THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.—At the session of the Commissioners, yesterday, an order was passed upon the Treasurer, for clothing for jail, on Leopold Weylen for \$21 87.

The following persons were discharged from jail: James Ryan, Wm. Lilley, James Donnelly, Thomas Richards, Benedict Center, and John Brady.

The delinquent list of chattel property was read, according to law.

THE POST-OFFICE GUIDE is the title of a new publication in pamphlet form, just issued by U. S. Williams of this city.

It contains a complete list of Post-offices in the United States, a list of distributing offices, rates of foreign and domestic letters and newspaper postages, and an abstract of the laws and regulations of the Post-office Department, all comprised in about a hundred pages and sold for twenty-five cents. The booksellers have it for sale.

AN EXPENSIVE MURDER.—A man named Antoine Brower, who has a fondness for masquerading, night before last appeared over the Rhine in female apparel, and being observed by some policemen, who, being much more prosy than even this lager-beer drinking town, arrested him, and lodged him for the night in the Station-house.

Yesterday Judge Pruden fined him \$5 and costs, but if the goodness of Justice did not own just then we have entirely mistaken her character.

INJURY FROM A FALL.—A young man named Charles Lowe, while engaged in painting the water tank, over the library, in the Court-house, late on Monday night, fell into the library room, a height of some thirty feet, breaking his collar bone and two of his ribs, besides sustaining a severe injury in the head.

He is a large heavy man, and fell with such force that a chair, with which he came in contact, was broken into forty fragments. He now lies in a precarious condition. It is supposed he was under the influence of liquor at the time of the occurrence.

TRULY UNFORTUNATE.—A man named Jacob Franck appeared, Monday morning, at the Police Court, and charged Alexander Driscoll with having stolen some little articles from him while both were confined in jail.

He stated that he was the father of twenty-six children, twenty-three of whom were still alive, and resided in Brown County; that he had been through the Mexican War and fought in the battles of Palo Alto, Monterey and Buena Vista, and that upon his body were thirty-six marks, which he had gotten in his hair-breadth escapes while in the field.

He came to the city to draw his pension, and got drunk, for which he was sent to the City Prison, where he was confined at the time the petty larceny was committed.

BOARD OF CITY IMPROVEMENTS.—The Board of City Improvements held their regular session this morning, at which the Clerk was directed to advertise for proposals for the following work: To pave with six inch lime stone Hindemargers alley, from Front street to Union alley; to bowlder Longworth street from Stone to Hoady street; to bowlder Graham alley from Sixth street to Western Row; to repair Vine street from Front to Second; to pave Sixth street from John to Smith; to pave the sidewalks on Hammond street; to bowlder Lodge street from Sixth to Seventh; to pave the sidewalks on Longworth street from Stone to Hoady. Mr. Bigelow offered a resolution to transmit to Council an ordinance to pave the sidewalks on Sixth street from Mound to Elm.

Also, an ordinance to assess a special tax on the real estate abutting on Hamilton Road from Main to Walnut, to defray the expense of repairing the street. The Commissioner of the Northern District was authorized to repair Fourteenth street, from Vine to Race, ten feet wide, \$20; also to repair the culvert under Bank street at a cost of \$3 50; also the culvert in the Post House Lot, at a cost of \$1 50.

LAW REPORT.

COMMON PLEAS.

CIVIL SIDE.—Leamon et al. vs. Eberole et al. A petition in error to reverse proceedings of the Probate Court. The defendants in error made application to the County Commissioners to vacate a County road in Spencer Township. The Commissioners refused, and on appeal to Probate Court the action of the Commissioners was reversed, and an order was made for the vacation of the road.

It was held by Judge Dickson that there was no law allowing an appeal to the Probate Court from an order of the County Commissioners refusing to vacate a County road, and the proceedings of the Probate Court were accordingly reversed.

DEEDS FOR DIVORCE.—Peter Sherline vs. Mary Sherline. Petition for divorce, and decree granted on the ground of adultery.

CRIMINAL BUSINESS.—Isaac Landis and Wm. Landis, convicted of receiving stolen property—jewelry taken from the store of Daniel Grabeck—were called up for sentence. They stated that they supposed the jewelry was honestly obtained by Alfred West. West had been convicted of embezzling the same property.

Judge Carter passed a sentence of three years' imprisonment in the Penitentiary on each of the prisoners.

INDICTMENT.—The Grand Jury reported an indictment against Dennis Galden and William Young for grand larceny.

TRIAL FOR BURGLARY AND LARCENY.—Daniel Mailborn, William Lamer and Julia Lamer stood indicted for breaking and entering the mill of Broadway Alley, and stealing therefrom four barrels of flour. The mill is in Ceterin Township. It appeared that on or about the 1st September last the mill was closed up at the usual hour—about nine o'clock at night—and that at daylight, next morning the door was found open, and a window smashed in from the inside. One witness testified that he had occasion to call at the house where Mailborn lived, on Sassafras street, and that Mailborn had two barrels of flour there, and wanted to sell him one at \$2 50 a barrel. The two other defendants were present, and Lamer said he had some flour also, and would sell at the same price. The barrel was marked "B. Sley," as the witness testified to Mailborn offering to sell her flour, about the same time, at \$1 a barrel. She saw them unloading the flour from a wagon.

Adam S. Hornung was sworn in as a Deputy Clerk in this Court.

SINGULAR CLAUSE IN A WILL.—The will of G. T. Williamson (whose death took place not long since in Europe) was admitted to probate yesterday. The testator wills half of his real estate in Ohio, Kentucky and Illinois to his mother, brother and sisters and their heirs, and the other half to his three children and their heirs. His personal property he gives to his wife, to be divided, if she thinks proper, with any of her children, in lieu of dower. The will then proceeds: "To James Taylor, of Newport, I bequeath my scorn and contempt for his treachery, duplicity and cowardice."

POLICE COURT.—A great variety of cases were presented to his Honor yesterday morning, all of which were disposed of in a session of little more than an hour.

A fellow named Abe Long, was sent over for ten days; John Smith for twenty; Dennis O'Brien for ten; Fred. Hagenburg for twenty; Bridget Duffy for twenty; George Garretson for five; James Curry for thirty; and Ann Datcheler fined \$2; William McGrew, \$2; Henry Horvick, \$3; John Stevenson, \$6, and costs—all for having taken into their mouths too much of that enemy which steals away men's brains.

A young and very small man, who, during the raid of Monday evening, proffered the shelter of an umbrella to an unassailed honor, stole one of those preventives of wet clothes, and was fined therefore \$15 and costs.

James Gallagher and Robert McFall, who raised a row at the Brighton House on Sunday, and behaved themselves in some other respects quite badly, were sentenced to be confined ten days each in the City Prison on bread and water.

A Driscoll, whom we mentioned in another column as having stolen some articles of minor value from an old Mexican soldier, while both were confined in the City Prison, was discharged by the testimony of a fellow named William Young, who said that if he told who stole the articles he would criminate himself.

A woman named Mary Porter, who kept a baggalo of the lowest character on Culvert street, near Seventh, was sent to Prison for thirty days, while her companions in vice, Margaret Schultz and Margaret Gilbert, were sent up for a like term, for vagrancy.

ATTEMPT TO OUTRAGE THE PERSON OF A MARRIED LADY.—A person named Philip Eblor, in the shape of a man, but who little deserves that title, was arraigned before Judge Pruden, yesterday morning, charged with that most abominable offense, viz: an attempt to dishonor a woman by force. The woman, in her story, said they both boarded at the same house on Elm street; that Eblor came into her room on the evening of Monday, fastened the door by taking off the knob, and attempted to despoil her of her virtue. She repelled his advances with her strength until that failed, and then called for help, which speedily arrived, and he was arrested. He was held to bail in the sum of \$400, and in default committed to await an examination on the 10th inst.

AN OLD NEBBER'S HOW-TO-FALL.—An old negro, named Mary Lewis, of very dissolute habits, residing on Sixth street, between Broadway and Culvert, yesterday fell from a porch, while intoxicated, into an alley, breaking her arm, and seriously bruising her head and face. Her habits and her habits, it is thought, will effectually prevent her recovery.
