The Mayoral Candidates.
It is publicly stated that Mr. FLAGG,
the Mayoral candidate of the Democracy,
is not, at this time, a resident of the city.
This, it is said, was urged against him in
Convention as a reason why he should not
be nominated, but the objection was over-
ruled. If it is a reason against a nomi-
nation, it is also probably against an elec-
tion. Unfortunately, the act of incorpora-
tion requires that the Mayor shall re-
side in the city, but it does not appear
that this provision was intended to in-
clude candidates for the Mayoralty. A
man may be a candidate, and reside so-
far as appears—in Nova Scotia or Nova
Zembla. If Mr. FLAGG is elected, he
will, doubtless, comply with the require-
ments of our organic law, and before he
enters upon the duties of his office, re-
turn to the bosom of "metropolitan" so-
ciety, and become one of our respectable
and peace-loving fellow-citizens. We
hope so. We said above, that "unfortu-
nately, the act of incorporation requires
that the Mayor shall reside in the city."

Perhaps the expression was too strong.
As a general thing, Mayors are of not
much account; and, it may be, upon the
whole, we do as well with them as we
should without them. The Mayors of
this city, from time immemorial, have
been negatives. A real self-acting man,
with a working engine of his own, would
be a novelty and a blessing. Shall we
never have such? If we could remove the
whole city government, Mayor, Council
and all, into some other quarter of the
world, it would be a decided improve-
ment; but, as that is impossible, perhaps
Mr. FLAGG, if he should be the choice of
the people, would be as safe a person
to reside within the limits of this cor-
poration, in an official capacity, as any
other. What is wanted is the best man. Mr.
FLAGG is a most amiable gentleman; so
we are informed, is his competitor—Mr.
Bisnor; and neither will willingly do
much harm in the place to which he ap-
pires.

A New Slavery Battle Field.
There are, it appears, symptoms of
what is called another contest between
slavery and freedom, to take place upon
the fields of Arizona. There are—or the
reports in respect to them are false—
organizations in the South, with a view to
plant slavery in that distant territory; and
—if these reports are believed—there
will be counter-organizations in the North,
to secure freedom in the same; both of
which will be wrong. No one who has a
distinct knowledge of the progress of
events in Kansas, will deny that, while
the result is the same that it would have
been had things been permitted to take
their natural course, a vast amount of
distress and crime and loss and disgrace
were the immediate effects of the Northern
and Southern combinations, for the origin
of which one party was nearly as much to
blame as the other.

If Arizona presents such natural in-
ducements to slavery as will prevail upon
the owners of negroes to go there volun-
tarily with their property, in the hope of
a profit upon their labor superior to that
which is realized in the present slave
States, then there is a possibility that
slavery may be planted there, and when
planted, continue to exist. But there is
no probability that such is the case. The
danger of the spread of slavery is not
when men combine in a spasmodic move-
ment to transport a few negroes to a new
country, but when planters, impelled by
considerations strictly of an economical
character, go there with their hands to
cultivate the soil and seek a profit out of
its productions. At present, whatever
may be the soil and climate of Arizona,
and however well adapted it may be to
the growth of the leading Southern sta-
ples, there is a vast expanse of territory
between here and there, equal to it in
these respects, to say the least, and hun-
dreds of miles nearer the great markets of
the world, whose inducements are greatly
superior, and will prove to be much more
practically powerful.

If there is an organized attempt in the
Southern States to plant slavery in Ariz-
ona, the best way to defeat it, on the
part of the North, is to let it alone.
Without profit, and without opposition,
the thing would expire for the want of
fuel in a very brief period. It is sorrow-
ful, therefore, to observe Northern jour-
nals laboring to get up a sensation upon
the subject, and calling for measures of
counteraction. A few swaggering pistol-
half brigand and half ragamuffin, with a
few negroes, can not plant slavery in a
new country, however well they may be
backed up with whisky, patriotism and
newspaper articles. It takes something
better and more permanent. It is not
the dangerous nor the perishing classes
that plant colonies and people States; it
is they who labor, and save, and build, and
produce.

PERSONAL CONFLICT IN COLUMBUS.—The fact
informs us that on Sunday morning, at a very
unreasonable hour, two young gentlemen—
Robert Chantry of the General Assembly, from
Butler County, and Mr. Huddard, Columbus
correspondent of the Cincinnati Enquirer—got
into a difficulty in the depot with a party
of railroad men, and in the melee knives, pistols
and iron pins were wielded successfully against
numerous parties. The police interfered, and
after a short struggle, succeeded in arresting
the two above mentioned. They were locked
up in the city prison for a short time, when
they gave bail for their appearance before the
Mayor on Saturday next.

Middleborough, Mass., cares for its widows.
At a recent town meeting it was voted that all
the widows in the town who pay no taxes,
should receive two hundred herring on present-
ing an order from the Selectmen.

STATISTICS OF OHIO.—The following state-
ment establishes the fact that no State in the
Union with equal extent compares with Ohio in
all these elements of prosperity and great-
ness.

The appraised value of cities and towns is
\$138,102,815; of lands, \$437,183,182; and of
chattel property, \$250,514,084—making an ag-
gregate of \$825,800,081. Within the past
seven years the aggregate value has nearly
doubled. The State debt is a little over \$16,
000,000, and a tax of two cents on the dollar
would more than pay it off.

The exports for 1855 (aside from manufac-
tures) amounted to \$50,350,000.

Of this amount, flour and wheat, notwith-
standing short crops, produced \$11,111,518.

The value of manufactured articles has not
been ascertained, though it is estimated that
those of Cincinnati alone exceed \$50,000,000.

The wheat crop has been increasing since 1854.
The crop of 1857 was 25,897,614 bushels, but
that of 1858 was one-fourth less.

The corn crop of 1857 was 52,555,188, the
heaviest ever raised in the State.

The crop of 1857 was 1,701,245 tons,
and of oats, 26,572,574 bushels; of railroads,
2,534, and of turnpikes, 2,900.

These statistics give some idea of the material
wealth and prosperity of this great State.
