

LATEST BY TELEGRAPH.

REPORTED FOR THE DAILY PRESS. Additional by the Northern Light.

New York, March 31.—Advices received by the Northern Light state that the Legislature of Nicaragua issued a special decree on the 4th inst., declaring the transit route free to all nations.

The Northern Light brings six hundred and seventy passengers, and \$137,000 in treasure. The dates from Valparaiso are to the 1st inst. Another abortive attempt at a revolution was made at Valparaiso on the 28th ult.

The revolutionary movement throughout Chili has assumed a dangerously powerful and popular position. By the arrival of an English mail steamer at Aspinwall, important news from Greytown is furnished.

The United States sloop-of-war Decatur, having anchored in a cove near San Juan del Sur, was mistaken for a filibuster, and President Martinez, with four hundred troops, immediately took possession of the transit route, to prevent the landing of the supposed filibusters.

On being apprised of the true character of the Decatur, he retreated, but destroyed the bridges. In the meanwhile the French officers, with a force, crossed the lake to the river San Juan, and seized the White steamers, and forcibly imprisoned the officers and crew.

They had not been released when the steamer left. Forts Castillo and San Carlos are to be given up to M. Bely and his men, for their headquarters. Three of the treaties negotiated by Sir Wm. Gore Ouseley, the British Minister, have been ratified.

The work-shops and houses at Punta Arenas, belonging to the Accessory Transit Company, have been swept off by the sea. According to the Panama Star, it was the Nicaraguan Government officers who took possession of the American lake boats which had been abandoned to M. Bely.

The reports are that all the southern part of Chili is in the hands of the Government. Talca has been delivered up without fighting. The general opinion was in a month the country would be as quiet as ever.

The New York Herald and Times on the Northern Light's News. New York, March 31.—The Herald, in editorially commenting on the important Nicaragua news furnished by the steamer Northern Light, uses the following language:

"It will be seen that President Martinez, of that Republic, has capped the climax of his hatred of the United States. All the transit steamers have been seized, the bridges destroyed, Americans imprisoned, and the route thrown open to the world, regardless of the rights of our citizens.

"When it is taken into consideration that these wanton acts were perpetrated immediately on the conclusion of the peace with England and Sardinia, and the arrival of the French expedition, under M. Felix Bely, there can be but one opinion as to the necessity of prompt and decisive action on the part of our government. Instructions should be immediately dispatched to our naval commanders to blockade all the Nicaraguan ports; General Juarez be at once dismissed; General Lamar recalled, and a suitable person sent to fill his place. The miserable government of the Central American States should receive a lesson, effective enough to save all future trouble in that quarter."

The Times says: "The seizure of the boats of the Transit Company is an invasion of American rights, and a trespass upon American property which can not pass unchallenged. If the President proves true to his pledges, and General Cass maintains the doctrines of his letter to Lamar, we shall speedily have this struggle brought to a close. The best thing the President can do is to recall Lamar, send a competent man to take his place, and put one or two men-of-war at his disposal. This whole matter has been trifled with too long already."

From Washington. WASHINGTON, March 31.—From all that can be learned it is not unsafe to say that if the statements relative to Sir Wm. Gore Ouseley's alleged visit to Nicaragua are correct, he has violated not only his own instructions, but the solemn understanding between the British Government and that of the United States.

If the facts are as stated, the President, it is said, notwithstanding the refusal of Congress to grant him the extraordinary powers to protect the rights and property of citizens of the United States, will exact a conformity with whatever may have been the written stipulations between the two Governments respecting Sir Ouseley's mission.

The recent outrage upon the vessels of the Atlantic and Pacific Steamship Company was to-day brought to the attention of the international officials, who are reported to have said that the property of American citizens shall and will be protected. The prospects now are that additional vessels will be dispatched to Nicaragua.
