The Empress Josephine.

Upon the little island of Martinique—almost lost among the brilliant gems of the Antilles—Josephine Rose Tascher de la Pagerie...

The young girl seemed to act upon the impulses of prophecy, for, at an early age, she visited Paris, and when but fourteen years old, married Count Beauharnais...

Josephine had two children by her first husband—Eugene and Hortense—whose histories more thrilling than romance, are known to all.

In 1787, hearing of the illness of her aged mother, Josephine returned to her distant home in the ocean, where she nursed her parent until the storms of insurrection compelled her to return to France...

Count Beauharnais had been one of the earliest and most active agents in the revolution, and was fated, of course, to be one of its earliest victims.

The impression of many writers is, that while associating with the Bernas family, she first met Bonaparte.

It is hardly necessary to say the young Hercules of Corsica was at once enamored of the beautiful widow, his passion, indeed, knew no bounds...

Josephine followed Bonaparte to Italy, and was with him at that splendid period when, in his conflicts with the Austrians, he established a reputation in heroic annals that will live forever.

Eugene Beauharnais had a son who married the sister of the present Emperor of Russia; one of her grand-sons is Louis Napoleon, Emperor of France...

Josephine exercised an astonishing control over Napoleon. His letters from Italy breathe the most ardent passion; and the most successful plans he ever executed came first under the review of his wife.

Josephine loved display and pomp, and whatever savored of royal or imperial magnificence. Her expenditures were so lavish that the Emperor, though he did not scruple to rob Rome of its treasures...

not scruple to rob Rome of its treasures of art to decorate Paris, thought her wasteful in the extreme, and often censured her very severely.

When Bonaparte became Emperor, he was consoled to secure a divorce. The proposition, however, was rejected by him, and on the 2d of December, 1804, Josephine was consecrated by Pope Pius VII. Empress of France...

That incident which cast a dark cloud over the glory of the Emperor, and a deep mantle of sorrow upon a proud and illustrious woman—that feature in the history of the great conqueror which all the shouts of fame an assembled world could raise could not drown, was the divorce, founded upon reasons of State.

Josephine was told that an heir was wanted by the family of Napoleon; that Austria, whose armies she had so often assisted her husband by her counsels to defeat, could be made the ally of France by a matrimonial alliance...

The loftiest features of the character of Josephine never shone until this dark hour; her heart, though desperately racked, did not break, and she prepared, like a stoic, for the awful sacrifice.

Napoleon always loved Josephine; after the divorce he often visited her, and at St. Helena his thoughts seemed all directed toward her. Never did woman love man more than Josephine loved Napoleon.

After the disastrous battle of Leipsic, she again thought of the Emperor, and offered to go to Elba, and share his exile. When the allies entered Paris, the King of Prussia and the Emperor of Russia sought Josephine at Malmaison.

When Napoleon left Paris to meet the armies of his powerful enemies, Maria Louisa was made Regent. After the overthrow of the Empire in the campaign of 1813-14, during which the French lost twelve hundred thousand men...
