SCHOOL BOARD LAST NIGHT.

The School Board last night, on the 30th of June, the rules of the Board require nominations of Teachers to be made to the Board at its first regular meeting in June.

Resolved, that the salaries of the Principal Teachers of the Intermediate Schools be fixed at the same rate, per month, or per annum, as the Principal Teachers of the District Schools, for the next ensuing school year.

The salary of a Principal Teacher of Intermediate Schools, is \$10 per month, and of District School, \$100 per month.

In face of a standing rule requiring amendments to lay over one week, Mr. Harding, Vice President, in the Chair, decided the resolution was in order.

The resolutions will be taken up for consideration at next meeting—when decision will be had as to salaries of all the teachers, viz: 1st District, Daniel Hough; 2, Abram S. Reynolds; 3, Wm. T. Forbes; 2 division of 4, John S. Highland; 5, Wm. E. Crosby; 7, B. O. M. DeBoek; 8, Uriah Rice; 9, C. C. Guilford; 10, P. L. F. Reynolds; 11, Wilbur B. Wheeler; 12, Thomas J. Toney; 13, John B. Trevor; 14, Auburn, W. H. Babodie; 1st Intermediate, John Hancock; 2, Mason D. Parker; 4, Cyrus Nason.

No nominations have yet been submitted to the Board in the following districts, viz: 5th and 14th district, and 1st division of 4th district, Orphan Asylum, and 3d Intermediate.

The new Board does not organize until the second Tuesday of July.

LAW REPORT.

THE ARMY OF GRAND JURORS ORIGINATED BY THE STATE OF NEW YORK, AND NEW PARTIES CALLED AND ESTABLISHED.—In the Criminal Branch of the Common Pleas Court yesterday morning, when the parties appeared to attend as Grand Jurors, were called, the Prosecuting Attorney filed a return, which the Court set aside, on the ground that the return was not in conformity with the provisions of the act in that behalf made.

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INJURY TO THE CROPS.

CLEVELAND, June 6.—Heavy frost on Saturday night. The wheat crop throughout Northern Ohio is badly injured or destroyed. Corn, grass and potatoes frosted.

ZANESVILLE, June 6.—Heavy frost in this neighborhood on Saturday night. Corn is entirely destroyed. A great many farmers are preparing to replant. Wheat is much damaged.

DANVILLE, N. Y., June 6.—There was a heavy frost in this vicinity on Saturday night, killing all the garden vegetables. It is also feared that fruit of all kinds has been cut off.

BUFFALO, June 6.—The severe frost on Saturday night, in this vicinity, has destroyed the fruit and potatoes, and it is feared doing heavy damage to other crops.

WHEELING, June 6.—Reports from the surrounding country say that the frost of Saturday night has destroyed the wheat and corn and all fruits.

By the Overland Mail. St. Louis, June 6.—The Overland California Mail arrived here Saturday night. Eight white men prospecting for silver near Honey Lake had been killed by the Indians. The house of Col. Stevenson, at Red Bluff, was burned on the 11th ult. Stevenson's wife, another woman and five children perished in the flames.

The Arizona, of the 19th ult., is filled with accounts of the proceedings of a band of regulators, who had driven all the Mexicans from Sonora Valley, and committed several murders. The Americans at Tabaco had publicly denounced these outrages, and a company of troops had been detailed from Fort Buchanan to suppress further outrages.

By the Utah Mail. St. Louis, June 6.—The Utah mail brings a proclamation of Gov. Cummins, commanding the immediate dispersion of various parties of Mormons, associated together in a military capacity in the mountains surrounding Salt Lake Valley.

The Valley Tan complains that this proclamation is not put into the hands of a Federal officer to execute instead of the Territorial Marshal, and asserts that treason is a crime in the Territory now as it was before the advent of the army.

The City of Washington's News. SAVANNAH, N. B., June 6.—A dispatch was received this morning from St. Johns, New Foundland, stating that further details of the new obtained from the City of Washington of Cape Race, were in the office of the Associated Press, but the Nova Scotia line, with the design of frustrating the receipt of the intelligence, refused to transmit any portion of the dispatch until the whole was received. Before this was accomplished, their line was reported out of order.

ACOSTA, GA., June 6.—It is confidently stated here, that the house of John Fraser & Co., of Charleston, suspended on Saturday, in consequence of a difficulty in negotiating sterling exchanges. The business, however, is abundant, and it is believed the suspension is only temporary.

Municipal Election. WASHINGTON, June 6.—The Municipal Election of today passed off quietly, without any of those scenes which have heretofore disgraced our city. There was no serious opposition to the Anti-Know Nothing ticket.

Arrival of the Indian. QUEBEC, June 6.—The steaming Indian is coming up. Her news thus far received, is merely a repetition of that received by the City of Washington of Cape Race. She will reach here to-night.
