### Luck.

Of all the words in our language, we most detest this. It means that some men are, as it were, pet children in the world, to whom its sweetmeats are given irrespective of their merits and labor. When we are too indolent to work for a thing, we trust to luck; when we are self-complacent to see our own blunders and follies, we deplore our "bad luck." Thus it is the base-metal coin of ignorance and laziness. Misadventure waiting for something to "turn up," the countryman standing by his imbogged cart with folded arms, and calling upon Hercules for help—these are the types of the believers in luck. We sometimes hear his friends saying to a youth just entering upon his career, "We wish you good luck." They mean nothing unfriendly by it; but it is a good thing that we have a Universe of Laws far wiser than our wishes.—Laws which, when we shall know more of them, will teach us to say to the youth, "Remember that God helps those who help themselves. Remember that there are no such things as luck, wind-fall, god-send; your destiny rests on your own heart, and your own right arm. There is a path leading to each thing; traveling on that path you reach that whereto it leads,—and that which you seem to grasp, without patiently fulfilling its conditions, is an illusion, and a lie, by no means the real thing!"

There is an impression abroad, still, that the Good and Nature can be cheated, and the Laws of the Universe evaded by blind ways, short cuts, royal roads, and what not. A man toils fifty years and amasses a fortune; his son does not toil a day, and gets all that his father earned; people say "he is in luck," "born with a silver spoon in his mouth," and so on. But, first, let us be sure that he really has or can have that money which he did not earn. To his father that wealth means something; industry, patience, prudence, diligence, good habits, have shaped themselves into gold and silver forms; they are the money of the money. The young heir knows nothing of the habits and virtues underlying the wealth,—he gets the mere glittering form. It becomes, to him, simply the temptation of his unformed character; it means not probity and industry, but fast horses and wine—so his riches go faster than his horses. This makes the spendthrift: a man can alone truly value that which he has earned. If he is of too selfish a nature to become a spendthrift, he becomes a sensualist and an idler. Not unfrequently do we hear of his exclaiming, "am I an Irishman or a Dutchman that I should work?"—soon followed by the crime of beating some vile woman to death, and passing on to the Penitentiary, even if, by his wealth and position, he can escape the gallows. And this is luck!

Very wise was that ancient poet who wrote,—

"Brother, if I were in a present make see that thou from him nothing take."

He knew the danger of climbing up "by another door" than honest toil into any benefit, and that it could not really enrich man but make him a beggar. A beggar is he who gets for nothing that which another has earned; and whether he asked for it or not, whether it be a dime or a million, makes only the difference of degree or form. We have often seen your "lucky man," and never knew him fail to bear out this statement. Generally he is a conceited, superficial, indolent fellow, whom, if he were not wealthy, men would easily recognize as an "idle puppy." He has learned nothing, because he has done nothing and endured nothing. Everything about him is skin-deep. Alas, if we could bring ourselves to use the phrase at all, it would be to exclaim for him, "unlucky man!"

We met the other day with a gentleman who lived in the neighborhood of Ex-President Tyler, of Virginia. We all know that Tyler has been often spoken of as "His Accidency." This gentleman said, in alluding to this, "People think that John Tyler's becoming President of the United States, was simply the result of the President's death. But those who know the man at home, as he has lived and worked for forty years, believe that there was no luck about it, but that he would have been President, at length, in any case. He is an honest man, a working and an able man, whatever may be thought of his politics. There was no

luck about it." It is true enough that accidents do not happen in this world. In all the roar of waters at Niagara, there is not one drop which is not obeying the exact laws of gravitation, attraction, action and reaction. In the roar of humanity, each drop obeys its laws with equal strictness. Take all the steps between you and your object, and you will reach it. Would you weave crow-bars into gauze? You can do it as surely as you can weave thread; you have only to take all the steps. Omit one blast of the furnace, one stroke of the hammer, and your wire gauze remains a crow-bar forever: no lucky chance will ever cause you to wake up and find that it has gone through the change at one leap. And the same will apply to every aim of life. An English statesman once claimed the secretaryship of the English Cabinet, for he said "I have served up to it and must have it." It was given to him,—for when a man has served up to anything he can claim it with authority. So let our young men serve up to things, let them earn them as they were meant to be earned, and let them say to every thought of luck, "Get thee behind me." They are lucky to be born safely, to have eyes to see the fair world, hands to struggle for a noble and happy life; their luck ended, the working day began. Let them fix in their minds the old saw, that "the longest way round is the shortest way home," let them live full under the truth, that in the throne of this Universe sits LAW and not WHIM.

The telegraph informs us that Garibaldi holds his ground in Northern Lombardy; that the Sardinians have crossed the Sesia, and driven the Austrians out of Palestro; that Napoleon's head-quarters are to be removed to Casale; and that no battle between the main body of the belligerents has taken place since last accounts.

The fight between the American and English sailors, at Florence, has been interpreted by some as an indication that Austrian tendencies prevail among the humbler classes of Englishmen, as well as among their aristocratic "brethren." But this is a hasty and unsound conclusion. The masses in England earnestly sympathize with the oppressed nationalities of Europe, and were it not for the barriers raised against a practical manifestation of their sympathy, by the ruling classes, Napoleon III. would not have been permitted to crush out the rising aspirations of the down-trodden Romans, as he did in 1849; nor would the Hungarians have been allowed to stand alone in their recent struggle against Austria and Russia.

At the present time, as well as formerly, the people (not the aristocracy) of England ardently wish well to the cause of Italian and Hungarian liberty, but, alas! they have no confidence in the Meteor King of Sardinia, nor in the Emperor of the French Empire. They "hug against hope," however, that, whatever the ulterior objects contemplated by the allied Sovereigns, they may be made the honored instruments of destroying tyranny and absolutism in Italy.

Meeting of the Young Men's Republican Association.

Pursuant to a call of the Young Men's National Republican Association, a meeting was held, in their rooms, Saturday evening.

Col. Perry was appointed Chairman, and William Sheppard Secretary.

The object of the meeting was stated to be that of taking some action in regard to organization for the coming canvass, and to endorse the action of the late Republican Convention.

As soon as the meeting was organized, Brother James, the great apostle of fusion, (as usual), offered a string of resolutions, as follows:

Resolved, That we heartily endorse the ticket put in nomination by the Republican State Convention, regarding it as one of the best tickets ever presented to the people of Ohio for their suffrages, and believing the nominees to possess all the elements of ability and capacity necessary to make an able administration of the affairs of the State.

Resolved, That we view with especial satisfaction the recognition, by the Convention, of the claims and wants of Hamilton County, in nominating for the Supreme Bench so able and eminent a jurist as our distinguished fellow-citizen, Hon. W. V. Ghobson.

Resolved, That we pledge ourselves to our friends in the several parts of the State, to meet and secure as thorough a repudiation of the Buchanan Democracy in this county this fall, as we have done in the recent city and county campaigns.

Resolved, That Benjamin Keggiator, Robert H. Cist, John C. Baum and Rufus H. Payne, be recommended as a committee to make arrangements for a mass meeting, at an early day, to take up the State ticket, and that they be requested to invite Hon. Wm. Dennison, Jr., Gov. Chase and Gov. Corwin to be present and speak at the meeting.

Mr. Mullett immediately offered the following substitute:

Whereas, It has been charged that the late State Convention of the Republican party, did not fairly express the sentiments of said party; therefore,

Resolved, That we endorse the action of said Convention fully and heartily.

Resolved, That a committee of five be appointed to make arrangements for a ratification meeting, to be held at such place as they may appoint.

Mr. M. contended that there was an entire lack of manliness in Mr. Elliott's resolution, as it manifestly was an attempt to evade the responsibility of endorsing the action of the convention, and called on the members to come up to the point without dodging. He also objected to Mr. Elliott's selecting a committee himself.

Mr. E. answered by saying that, although the Americans had publicly denounced the action of said convention, yet he understood the difficulty was nearly arranged, and seemed expressly anxious to promote what he termed harmony.

A gentleman whose name we did not learn, expressed himself strongly against fusion any longer.

Mr. Charles Cist here offered a motion to adjourn until next Saturday, which was lost.

Mr. Johnson then spoke to the resolutions which had been offered, saying that he thought it the duty of the County Executive Committee to call this ratification meeting, and hoped the Association, out of respect to the Americans, would not take the responsibility of appointing them on the committee.

The vote was then taken on the substitute, and it was lost; whereupon the question recurred on the adoption of the original resolutions, and the first three were passed without a dissenting voice.

At this point another debate sprung up on the adoption of the fourth resolution, in which the same arguments which had before been offered were brought forward in a disguise, nothing new being offered except that J. Lee Love thought the ratification meeting would open the canvass, and it was much too soon to have this occur.

Dr. Daniels moved to table the fourth resolution, which was lost.

They were then passed by one majority.

On motion of Charles H. Fosdick, Messrs. Baker and Johnson were added to the committee.
