SPICIAL JURY TO HEAR THAW CASE

New York, Jan. 11.—An order for a special panel in the case of Harry K. Thaw, charged with the murder of Stanford White, was signed by Justice Fitzgerald in the supreme court yesterday.

The order calls for a special panel of 299 talemans for a special jury to appear in court, on Monday, January 21.

This action on the part of Justice Fitzgerald appears to dispose of rumors that difference of opinion between the justice and the district attorney might result in a postponement of the beginning of the Thaw trial. Evidence of this feeling was shown only a few hours before the order was signed, when the justice refused an application made for such an order by the district attorney.

RANSOM DEMANDED

Son of a New York Broker is Kidnapped and Police are on the Trail.

New York, Jan. 11.—The dragnet has been thrown out by the police all over the city, today, to capture the kidnapers of little Salvatore Saitti, aged six, the son of Antonio Saitti, a wealthy broker, from whom \$10,000 ransom is demanded. The child disappeared from in front of the home in Harlem, yesterday afternoon. The police believe the boy is hidden away on the lower east side.

JAPANESE FLEET

Will Not be Sent to American Waters for Fear of Renewing the San Francisco Controversy.

Tokio, Jan. 11.—The Japanese government has decided that on account of the anti-Japanese agitation on the Pacific coast that the training squadron will not visit the Pacific coast, but will go as far as Honolulu only.

Washington, Jan. 11.—Members of the California delegation in congress in discussing the decision of the Japanese government to abandon the proposed trip of the training squadron to the Pacific coast on account of the anti-Japanese agitation, expressed the opinion that San Francisco would have extended a welcome to the fleet. Masanao Hanhara, second secretary of the Japanese embassy, last night said that Viscount Aoki, the Japanese ambassador to the United States, has not been officially notified of the Tokyo government's decision not to allow the training squadron to proceed to San Francisco.

Mr. Hanhara stated most positively that the question of the fleet or the Japanese seamen being in danger at San Francisco had not been considered or even suggested; that it was feared the presence of the fleet might cause a renewal of the controversy.
