SEVERE WAS THE STORM

That Swept Over County Saturday Night.

MUCH DAMAGE RESULTS

From the Hard Wind and Heavy Rainfall.

Windows and Doors Blown in Buildings Unroofed, Trees Torn Out and Fences are Leveled.

One of the most severe rain and wind storms experienced in many years struck the city Saturday night about nine o'clock and much damage was done throughout the city and county.

The winds commenced about five o'clock in the afternoon and coming from the south and south west, gradually increased in velocity until the storm broke and driven by the fierce winds the water came down in bucketfuls drenching hundreds of Saturday night shoppers who were on the streets.

The winds continued to increase in velocity until about three o'clock Sunday morning when a rate of about fifty miles an hour was reached and accompanied by a heavy rain the wind threatened to tear sleeping Marion up by the roots and land it somewhere near Bucyrus.

Windows in many residences were broken, sheds were torn from out-houses and small buildings, trees were torn up by the roots and branches were broken off like so much chaff. Telephone wires are down all over the county. Telegraph and electric light wires were in bad shape and practically all of the wires of the Western Union and the Postal companies were rendered useless. At the quarries several smoke stacks were blown down and several small buildings were unroofed.

A plate glass window in the store of H. C. Krause on North Main street was broken by the wind and one of the heavy doors at the high school building was torn from its fastenings and thrown a number of feet away. The hinges had been broken off and the Yale lock broken in many pieces. A glass display case sitting in front of the goodsell store was blown down and broken the winds scattering muffs and furs over the street. The goods were taken charge of by the police. Many other instances of damage done by the wind were reported Monday.

At Morral a part of the roof of the new bank building was torn off and the interior of the building was badly damaged by the heavy rain. Fences and sheds were broken up. The damage over the county was about uniform small buildings and fences suffering the greater amount of injury.

The weatherman reports a rainfall of nearly three quarters of an inch and the floods were increased. The water continued to rise in most of the county streams until Monday morning and a number of families in Prospect, LaRue and Waldo were forced to leave their homes which the water threatened to carry away. This morning it was reported from Caledonia, LaRue, Green Camp and Prospect, that the water is receding and it is believed that most of the danger is past.

The high water between New-mau's and Prospect covered the C. D. and M. tracks and washed it out in several places forcing the company to abandon its through service from one o'clock Sunday afternoon until this morning at ten o'clock. At the latter hour the through service was resumed.

MRS. LAURA GARDNER PASSES AWAY

Death was Very Sudden and Unexpected.

Sudden Turn for the Worse Takes Place Sunday and Death Soon Follows.

Mrs. Laura I. Gardner, aged fifty-six years, seven months and fourteen days died at her home at No. 228 North Grand Avenue at 11:30 o'clock Sunday evening.

Mrs. Gardner's death was very sudden and unexpected. She had been sick for several days but was not confined to her bed until Friday evening when she suffered a stroke of apoplexy which rendered her prostrate. She seemed to rally somewhat from the effects Saturday and her condition was hardly considered critical until late Sunday when she took a turn for the worse and death soon followed.

The husband and one daughter Mrs. Mary Margaret Griffin residing on Barnhart street, survive. There are also three grandchildren living. They are Elmer, John Wesley and Richard Edmond Griffin. There are two brothers and one sister living: William Patten of Bellefontaine; Lorenzo Patten of Mansfield and Mrs. G. W. Showen of Indianapolis, Indiana.

Funeral services will be conducted from the home at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, Rev. D. H. Bailey of Epworth M. E. church officiating. Interment will be made in Marion cemetery.

INTERURBAN ROADS FIGHTING HARD

To Secure Connecting Link Out of Lima

Schoepf People Endeavoring to Shut Out the Lima, Kenton and Marion Line.

A special telegram from Lima today says:

Contracts are being let in sections for the building of the Schoepf connecting link between Bellefontaine and this city, and the road will be speedily completed in order to shut off the proposed Lima, Kenton & Marion, the Straug gasoline road, which is building out of Kenton and heading this way.

General manager Ogan of the Lima, Kenton and Marion road, is authority for the statement that the gasoline road is a surety. The engineers have finished, the bridges are ordered, and only grading contracts hang fire. With the completion of the Bellefontaine link the Columbus & Lake Michigan, still being operated between here and Defiance as a steam road, will at once be electrified, as all franchisees have been secured.

SAVED HER COMPANION

But Nearly Gave Her Life in the Attempt.

LITTLE CLARA LOWNY

Rescued From a Watery Grave Near Prospect.

Seeing Her Playmate Drowning Gladys Henry Throws Herself Into Stream and Both are Saved

Only the daring heroism of Gladys Henry, aged 12 years, prevented her playmate, Clara Lowny, aged 13 years, from death in the icy waters of Patten's run, a small stream flowing into the Scioto river, at Prospect, Sunday afternoon.

The little girls were playing along the banks of the run and watching the high water which threatened at any minute to flow over the banks. They decided to cross to the other side by going over a small plank bridge about eighteen inches wide. Miss Lowny made the first attempt and tried to run over the bridge, slipped and fell into the water, which was about fifteen feet deep. Her companion saw her, and rushing out on the plank, threw herself into the water, holding on to the plank with one hand, and with the other hand she grabbed her little playmate as she arose to the surface the second time. By this time, little Miss Lowny was unconscious, and it was all the rescuer could do to maintain her hold on the plank.

Shouting loudly for help, the heroine attracted Toby Lowny, the father of the girl, who came to the rescue and pulled the children from their perilous positions. They were taken to their homes, restoratives applied and today both are recovering nicely from their thrilling experiences.

Little Miss Henry is the heroine of the village and is being highly praised for her great courage in saving the life of her little friend at the risk of her own.
