GRANTED A DIVORCE

Judge Young Corrects a Matrimonial Misfit.

ANOTHER CASE HEARD

But the Ruling is Withheld for a Time.

Catherine Kaufman Files a Pleading in the Selter-Marion Manufacturing Company.

Notwithstanding that Friday was a holiday, Judge Young heard a couple of divorce cases late in the afternoon. The first was that of Alva C. Warner against Effie Warner. The couple were married May 6, 1922, in Wapakoneta, and one child has been born to the union. The husband claims that his wife has been guilty of gross neglect of duty; that she associated with married men of bad repute and informed him that she cared more for another than for him. It is averred that she is now and has been in Celina for some time and refuses to live with him. The court granted him a divorce and custody of the child. The plaintiff to pay the costs.

Through her attorneys Jacoby and Donlithen, Catherine Kaufman today filed an answer and cross petition in the matter of Henry Selter against the Marion Manufacturing company. She alleges that she received a judgment against the defendant company in the sum of \$2319.88 on two notes, June 30, 1906, and that no part of this judgment has been paid. She therefore asks the court to ascertain the names of stockholders and order an assessment sufficiently large to cover the amount of her claim.

The divorce proceeding of Otto F. Merkle against Eva L. Merkle, was heard by Judge Young Friday afternoon. The defendant is charged with gross neglect of duty and adultery and in her answer and cross petition makes practically the same allegations against her husband. After hearing all the testimony, the court took the matter under advisement and will render a decision later.

The appeal matter of John H. Kinsler against the C. C. & St. L. railway company has been dismissed and the costs paid.

Judge Young today dismissed the matter of the State of Ohio on complaint of Benjamin Waddell against Christian F. Augenstein. This was a peace complaint matter and the costs of the action were assessed against the plaintiff.

The common pleas court has issued an order of attachment and garnishment against the Big Four railroad, attaching all moneys in the company's hands belonging to W. R. Waddell. This was done in pursuance of an affidavit in aid of execution filed Friday by Charles Hofstetter, who claims to hold an unsatisfied judgment against Waddell for \$1279.

SEQUEL TO THE FIGHT

John Utrevis is Fined for Shooting Within the City.

UTREVIS PLEADS GUILTY

Wednesday Night's Affair is Probably Closed.

Young Man Has His Hands Torn by a Playful Dog—News of the Police Court.

A sequel to the fracas at the Royal rink Wednesday night occurred yesterday afternoon when John Utrevis, one of the employees of the rink, was arrested charged with shooting promiscuously within the city limits. The charge was filed by Chief of Police Cornwell. Utrevis pleaded guilty to the may- or when given a hearing and was fined \$5 which he paid. During the fight Utrevis drew a pistol and fired, evidently without taking any aim whatever, or without intent to harm any one. The bullet broke a plate glass window across the street from the rink and lodged in the sash.

The young son of John Arndt, of West Church street, was bitten on the hand yesterday afternoon by a large dog, and Mr. Arndt wants the police to dispatch the canine. It develops that the dog is a playful animal and when the boy came along the street carrying a bundle of bills that he was passing, the dog grabbed the bills in his mouth and made away with him. In taking the bills from the lad's hand his teeth tore the flesh in several places. The boy was forced to go back to the store and get another supply of bills.

J. L. Smucker, treasurer of the rink company, appeared at the mayor's office this morning and filed affidavits against John Hoeter and Merrill Wise, charging them with assault and battery. The arrests were made this afternoon and it is probable that the men will be given a hearing tonight. Hoeter and Wise are the men who were mixed up in the fight with Smucker at the time when Utrevis started the pistol play.

BERNARD WALSH DIES QUITE SUDDENLY

Relapse of Pneumonia Causes His Demise.

The Young Man was Thought to Have Recovered From the Disease.

Apparently in fair health until an hour before his death, Bernard Walsh, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Walsh, died today at 12 o'clock at his home on Patterson street, death resulting from a sudden relapse of pneumonia from which it was thought he had entirely recovered.

Mr. Walsh was taken ill some time ago with pneumonia suffering a very severe attack. After his recovery he gave up farming and came to this city. He was down town yesterday and caught a cold. About eleven o'clock he felt ill and went to bed his condition becoming rapidly worse. The deceased was 32 years of age. He was born in this city and had lived here the greater part of his life. Beside the father and mother, two sisters, Mrs. Elmer Rhoads and Mrs. Harley Chamberlain, the latter of Bucyrus, and three brothers, John, Frank and James, survive. The funeral arrangements have not as yet been completed.
