the special bonded indebtedness of \$108,508. This large increase in the city's debt is partly accounted for by the fact that three park sites were purchased.

The total of the city's tax duplicate now reaches \$6,710,600, and the law stipulates that the general bonded indebtedness of the city shall not be increased in any one year to exceed one per cent of the tax duplicate.

With a condition like this confronting the taxpayer it is little wonder that some have arisen and sought to reduce the debt of the city.

It is true that the officials are meeting with little or no difficulty in disposing of the bonds. The credit of the city has not been impaired in the least.

With a progressive city like Marion, it is impossible to stop improvements and maintain the healthy growth and we do not want to be considered as advocating a cessation of needed improvements.

is known as the new criminal court building. To be still more exact, it is built upon the site of Newgate Prison, and to go back in history and romance and legend it may be stated that Newgate Prison was "Old Bailey."

"Old Bailey" Twin brother in misery of the Bastille. Wherever the English language is spoken, wherever books are read, those art known. Do we desire a picture of infamy, we unlock thy ancient gates. Do we desire a picture of man's inhumanity to man, we look upon thy scarred walls through the imagination's eye.

Of a vision of hate, or something with which to stir the blood to boiling, or sympathy for those who have gone before, of the unfortunate ones; of the erring ones and those who were sinned against—do we but want to recall such things, we think of "Old Bailey" For there, in the very heart of London town, seven hundred years and more of wretchedness existed; seven hundred years of ignorance upon the part of those who stood without the walls; seven hundred years of conspiracy, and connivance, and deceit, and duplicity and of cruelty and of mistaken justice—that is what you represent!

Before America was discovered you stood a blighting thing in men's lives, a ghost-like form ever threatening, never loving; a thing little children passed and trembled; a thing women looked at and wept a thing before which strong men quaked, because they knew that you were without heart of mercy a maw into which the strong cast the weak.


It has only been within the memory of men now living that public executions ceased to take place at Newgate prison. Up until 1868 great crowds gathered about the place and witnessed those public executions, jeered and jested at the unfortunates. That is how far we have advanced these forty years.

In the hey-day of its career, men were thrown into "Old Bailey" upon trumped-up charges, and died before they were given a trial. All that was necessary to obliterate a man was to accuse him of owing you a debt.
