nor authorize their signatures being attached.

At the present time the ordinance to proceed with the paving of the street has passed to its second reading and on next Monday night it will be read for the third time and its adoption moved. The ordinance will be adopted.

At that time it is expected the property owners will take action and try to have the legality of the action of council tested. In the ordinance no provision is made for the laying of water mains on the street and should council lay the paving the water mains will be necessary later and will cause the street to be torn up. Sewer and sidewalks are being put in at the order of the city council and with the additional assessments those of the property owners who have their residences on that part of the street south of Walnut street will of necessity have to sell their properties.

With the street intersections and the city park property the city will come in for about \$3000 expense for the improvement. This amount must be paid by the city at large for a pavement to run through the country. The majority of the lots are owned by men who are holding them for purposes of speculation and which, if sold within the next eighteen months, will mean that the purchasers must pay the assessments.

Opponents of the paving deal are confident that it can be defeated in the courts and a desperate fight will be made against it.

**RESIDENTS DETERMINED**

To Fight the Prospect Street Paving Deal.

**COMMON PLEAS COURT**

Will be Appealed for an Injunction.

Then the Property Owners will Test the Legality of the Action of Council in the Matter.

Residents of South Prospect street, owning property south of Walnut street, do not intend to sit quietly by and allow the city council to pave the street, put assessments on their properties that they will be unable to pay and it is probable that the court of common pleas will be asked for an injunction to prevent the paving being laid.

It will be remembered that there was a big scrap in the city council at the time the paving matter was brought up in the shape of a resolution to pave the street, before even a petition had been presented. The resolutions was withdrawn and a petition secured. It was claimed by Dr. J. G. Seiter, of the council, that any of the names of property owners having their residences south of Walnut, that were on the petition were fraudulently secured. Most of those whose names were on the petition were willing to make affidavits that they did not place them there
