BOSS BARBERS ENTER TRUST

Order Goes Into Effect April 29.

EXPECT SOME KICKING

But Patrons Will Soon Become Reconciled.

Marion Men Can Prepare Themselves to Pay Five Cents When They Get Necks Shaved.

After Monday, April 29, patrons of Marion barber shops will have to pay five cents extra to get their necks shaved. All of the boss barbers of the city have signed an agreement to make this change, the last one having attached his signature to the document Thursday.

"The scale of prices in Marion barber shops has always been lower than the scales in other cities of the state," said a proprietor of one of the uptown shops, Thursday. "We have carefully considered the matter, and have decided that a neck shave is worth five cents."

Ever since the tonorial shop was started in Marion, the male population has enjoyed the luxury of a complete shave for only 10 cents.

Up until a few years ago, a hair-cut in Marion cost only 20 cents, but the boss barbers got together and decided that the price was too low.

They accordingly boosted it to 25 cents and there it has stood since. "There will be lots of kicking when we begin to charge extra for a neck shave," said one of the boss barbers, Thursday, "just as there was when we raised the price of a hair-cut. It won't be long, though, until the public will get accustomed to paying 15 cents and no complaints will be heard. That's just the way it was with the hair-cut proposition. No one ever kicks any more on paying 25 cents."

The only time that the five cents extra charge will not be made for a neck shave will be when the patron gets a hair cut.

The movement will have a decided tendency to cause the patrons to give up the practice of offering tips.

Already a number of young men of the city have organized what will be known as the Anti-neck shaving club. They have secured pleasant quarters on West Center street and have elected officers for the ensuing year. The members will meet once a week for the purpose of shaving each other's necks.

Railroad Notes

R. P. Hankey, G. W. Meeker, Emmitt Tompkins, Eugene Gray and W. A. France yesterday incorporated the Columbus, Marysville and Bellefontaine Railway company with a capital stock of \$25,000.

The men behind the new company are those interested in the Findlay-Marion Railway and Light company, and propose to build an electric line from Columbus to Marysville and Bellefontaine, paralleling the Toledo and Ohio Central railway.—State Journal.

As a penalty of running through a closed switch, nearly the entire crew of the Sandusky-Marion freight crew (local) was suspended for one week. A few days ago the local in charge of conductor W. L. Hamacher, of Marion, was running south of Bucyrus when the train ran through a closed switch, owing to the neglect of some of the trainmen, and consequently the crew were compelled to pay the penalty.

Chicago and Erie passenger train No. 21 was laid out nearly one hour in the local yards this morning caused by the engine being derailed near the Erie gas house. The tracks spread, allowing the engine to be precipitated to the ground. The local yard crew after strenuous labor, succeeded in placing it on the rails without the assistance of the Galton wrecking crew.

A gang of men began work this morning on re-roofing the Erie telegraph tower. The old roof was slate but had so many holes in it that during the heavy rain of last month, a great deal of damage was done to office material. It is probable that after the new roof is complete, the building will be painted and given a general renovating on the interior.
