OFFICERS ARE ELECTED

Nine Meetings are Scheduled for Coming Year.

Wayside Rose Rebekahs Will go to Morral Friday May 17—Special Meeting of Masons Next Week

Representatives of the nine Odd Fellow lodges of the county held a meeting in the hall of Kosciusko Lodge No. 58, on North Main street, Friday evening, and perfected the organization of the Marion county I. O. O. F. association. The gathering also celebrated the eighty-eighth anniversary of the order. The object of the association is to bring the various lodges of the county into closer relationship, and by holding meetings frequently, to enable each lodge to benefit by the ideas used in other lodges. The officers chosen are Charles G. Ritzler, Green Camp, president; L. G. Wassor, Marion, vice president; B. F. Haller, Marion, secretary; R. B. Bell, LaRue, assistant secretary; L. E. Rinker, Calsonia, treasurer; H. E. Washburn, Morral; Wesley Baker, Agosta; T. J. Court, Prospect; J. W. Cook, Waldo; A. E. Schaeffer, Marion, executive committee. It was decided to hold nine meetings during each year, so that one meeting may be held at each place represented in the association. The

next convention will take place at Green Camp. The officers and executive committee will meet at the hall of Kosciusko Lodge, May 27, to arrange a schedule of meetings for the first year.

Besides perfecting an organization, the convention witnessed the conferring of the first degree on one candidate by the degree team of Salt Rock lodge of Morral. This lodge is the baby Odd Fellow organization of the county. Its degree team comprises 28 men.

A banquet and smoker were enjoyed by the 300 men present. Speeches were given by Mayor Scherff, J. J. Crawley and others.
