CUPID CONNOT BE OUTDONE

Lovers of Twelve Years Ago are Wedded.

DAVIDSON-ELMES

Nuptials Solemnized Wednesday Morning.

Courtship Which Began at Santa Cruz More Than a Decade Ago Ends at Hymeneal Altar.

More than 12 years ago, Mrs. Carra Davidson and Mr. Frank C. Elmes were engaged to be married at Santa Cruz, California, where both then resided. The engagement was broken, and after that Mrs. Davidson was married three times, and Mr. Elmes was married once. Wednesday their betrothal of years ago was renewed and they were married by Justice Charles H. Conley, at his office on South Main street. The ceremony took place shortly before 10 o'clock, and was witnessed by only a few relatives and friends.

The bride, who has been prominent as an actress for a number of years, is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Davidson, of the Boulevard. Mr. Elmes is prosperous dry goods merchant at Findlay. Mrs. Elmes expects to leave the stage and make her home in Findlay.

The events leading up to this rather romantic marriage are unusual in many ways. In the local court of common pleas about two weeks ago the bride was divorced from her last husband, Joseph Horsnyder, of Cincinnati. Mr. Horsnyder is an actor and became acquainted with his former wife through their connection with the stage.

Mrs. Elmes was first married in Celina, Ohio, to J. H. Caldwell, a prominent citizen of that place. She was then scarcely more than a mere girl and had not entered upon her stage career.

It was after being divorced from Mr. Caldwell that Mrs. Davidson met Mr. Elmes. Their engagement followed after a brief courtship, and they would have been married at that time had not unforeseen difficulties arisen.

After the broken engagement, Mrs. Davidson went on the stage, and sometime afterward met Albert Mudge, an actor, to whom she was married. Afterward she and Mr. Mudge were divorced, but on the following day married again. A second time they were divorced, and Mrs. Davidson was then married to Mr. Horsnyder, from whom he was only recently separated through a decision of Judge Young.

SEITER NOT AN ASPIRANT

For Republican Majority Nomination.

SOME ARE CONFIDENT

That Louie Cannot be Defeated for Second Term.

Quiet Boom Started for John H. Bartsam and Harry Scribner as Candidates for the Office.

Dr. J. G. Seiter, member of the city council, enemy of the asphalt trust and proud champion of the people's rights, is not an active aspirant for the republican majority nomination. At least that is what may be inferred from a conversation with the doctor, although he does not come out directly and deny that there is some such ambition encoosed in his mind.

"I don't think that there is a man in Marion who will say that I ever told him I want to be mayor" the doctor said, Monday, in answer to the question as to whether he would be after the nomination when the proper time arrives.

"Of course a man doesn't know what he would do should a nomination of this kind be thrust upon him," says the aggressive German councilman. "But I don't think that there is much thrusting being done in Marion politics at present."

The doctor thinks that this is particularly so in regard to the oncoming fight for the republican majority nomination. There are a number of good men who will seek to head the ticket, he says, and he does not believe that the nomination will be "thrust" on any one.

The fact of the matter is that Dr. Seiter has some friends who are quietly going through the highways and byways even at this early date saying that he is the man who would be the opponent of Mayor Scherff. And these people believe that the nomination would not be refused.

At any rate, it is certain that the republican leaders of the city are doing everything possible to pick out the strongest man to head their ticket. Whoever the candidate may turn out to be will have plenty to handle making a good showing against Mayor Scherff for his second term.

"I don't believe there is a man in Marion who can beat Louie for his second term" is the belief expressed by one of the city's leading Democrats, a few days ago.

And that's where the situation lies. The democrats are lying back and resting easy in the knowledge that all they have to do is to renominate the present mayor and have a candidate who is not only almost certain to elect himself, but will help much to carry the rest of the ticket through to victory. At the same time the republicans are losing sleep trying to think of the best man to pit against the bustling little chief executive.

A quiet sort of a boom was started recently for John H. Bartram, junior member of the law firm of Copeland & Bartram. They say the republicans could get no stronger man for the majority candidate than Mr. Bartram and some of his boosters think that he would accept the nomination.

Another man who has been receiving mention as a possible candidate is Harry Scribner, who recently retired from the grocery business. Harry, it is reported, is in such a position that he would take the nomination.

CONVOCATION ADJOURNS

After Most Successful Meeting Tuesday.

REVEREND WITHYCOMBE

Takes Suddenly Ill During Evening Session

Rev. Alsop Leffingwell Delivers a Very Interesting Address on "Missions of the Church in Ohio"

Probably the most interesting session of the Episcopal convocation at St. Paul's church, was held Tuesday afternoon with a large congregation in attendance.

The meeting was opened with the reading of a paper by the Rev. W. C. White, of the Church of the Redeemer, at Lorain, on the subject, "Progress Toward Church Unity." "The Church's Official Attitude Toward Confession," was the subject of a very interesting paper by Rev. J. M. Withycombe, rector of St. Andrew's Church, Elyria; Rev. A. N. Slayton, rector of Grace church, Sandusky, spoke on "Omissions from the Creed."

Following each of the number the visiting clergymen discussed the remarks of the speakers at length. In the evening, a very distressing incident occurred that caused the convocation to abruptly adjourn. Rev. Alsop Leffingwell, general missionary of the Diocese of Ohio, was making an address, when Rev. Mr. Withycombe, of Elyria, was taken suddenly ill. Emitting a cry of distress, he fell to the floor, and great confusion resulted among the large crowd that was in attendance. Medical attention was secured and the patient was revived and was able to return to his home today.

Rev. Mr. Leffingwell spoke of the missions of the church in Ohio and told of the work in extending the church throughout to rural districts. The services were interspersed with musical numbers by the choir.

The convocation was one of the most successful that has ever been held in the Sandusky district of the church.
