KOCH IS SUED FOR DIVORCE

Wife Says He Threatened to Kill Her.

LILLEY DAMAGE SUIT

Against the Railway Company Submitted on Brief

Deputies Complete Work of Checking Up Books—Report Filed With Commissioners—Court News.

A suit for divorce against Wm. M. Koch was started in the court of common pleas Saturday morning by Orrie Koch. The defendant is a brother of Charles Koch, whose wife was granted a divorce only a few weeks ago.

The defendant is a well known farmer living near Caledonia. His wife charges that Mal 1, 1907, he grabbed her around the neck and threatened to kill her and their two children with a shot gun. The children are Mildred aged 14, and Rupert aged 12. Mr. and Mrs. Koch were married May 14, 1890.

Mrs. Koch recites that she has always been a dutiful and faithful wife, but that her husband has been abusive. She says that he owns 80 acres of land in Scott township, besides horses and farming machinery valued at \$2,500. She asks the court to enjoin Koch from disposing of his property or in any way encumbering it. Judge Young granted a temporary injunction. Mrs. Koch asks for temporary alimony pending suit, and for the custody of her children.

Deputy County Auditor Jay Spaulding and Deputy Treasurer Glenn Jones have completed their work of checking up the books of their respective offices, and the records are now in the best condition in years. The two deputies went over the books for about five years back, working until an exact balance was secured.

As a result of this checking up, the monthly report filed by Deputy Spaulding with the county commissioners, Friday, was the first correct and complete report that has been compiled in years. It shows the exact condition of the county funds, May 1.

Railroad Notes

The statement of earnings of the Hocking Valley Railway company for March tells eloquently of the damage wrought by the floods along its lines in that month. For the month, the company earned gross \$425,455, as against \$561,236 in March of 1906. The operating expenses were \$364,470, against \$384,562. The total available income for the month was \$61,000, as against \$176,532, showing a deficit in net income of \$5,480 as against \$112,540 net income in March 1906, or a loss of over \$118,000 over March, 1906.

For nine months the gross was \$4,550,231, against \$5,054,325 for the corresponding period ended March 31, 1906. The operating expenses were \$3,485,419, against \$3,187,575 and the net income was \$1,475,581, or a decrease in net income for the nine months of \$345,000.

Owing to the floods of March, traffic on the Hocking division of the

company was entirely suspended from the 12th to the 25th, causing a large loss in coal earnings, and a big increase in operating expenses.

It is said that George H. Ross, second vice president and general manager of the Toledo, St. Louis and Western railway, may be successor to the late Captain G. J. Grammar. The report is persistent although the officials of the New York Central Lines refuse to discuss it.

The Pennsylvania company has reduced the rates on strawberries from Delaware and Maryland states, which will enable the shippers to make a much wider distribution of their berries this season.

Thomas Scanlon, road supervisor of the C. & E., with headquarters at Kenton, Ohio, was looking after business in local railroad circles today.

An order for two hundred steel passenger cars, to be used in the New York Tunnel, was placed yesterday by the Pennsylvania company.
