## ORDINANCE NO. 25.

Accepting John Nunin's 1st Addition to the City of Marion, Ohio.

Be it ordained by the Council of the City of Marion, State of Ohio: Section 1. That John Nunin's 1st Addition to the City of Marion, Ohio, being a sub-division of the north part of lots Nos. 336 and 337 in Sloan's Addition to Marion, Ohio, and being part of the north part of the north-east 1-4 of Section 28, township 5, south range 15 east, Marion, Marion County and State of Ohio, beginning at a stake in the east line of Blaine Avenue 140 feet, north of north line of Columbia Street; thence north on the east line of Blaine Avenue 262.5 feet to a stake in the south line of east and west alley; thence east on the south line of said alley 257 feet to a stake 100 feet west of the west line of Windsor Street; thence south parallel with the west line of Windsor Street 262.5 feet to a stake; thence west parallel with the north line of Columbia Street 268 feet to the place of beginning, be and the same is hereby accepted.
