Attending Annual Meeting of Marion Council.

### THE SUPER-EXCELLENT

Marion, May 14.—The climax of today's session of the great council of Ohio Red Men was the street trail this evening. More than 3,000 men were in line, and the trail led through three miles of the streets of the city, which were brilliantly illuminated with red fire. The main business sessions, at which officers will be elected, will be held Wednesday.

## SHOOK HIS FIST UNDER THE PRESIDENT'S NOSE

Tennessee Postmaster is Removed From Office by the "Big Stick" and He Shows His Southern Fighting Blood to the President.

Washington, May 15.—The president hit Representative Brownlow, of Tennessee, with the big stick yesterday by removing Col. Arch M. Hughes, postmaster of Columbia, from office. Hughes is Brownlow's man.

The lone Republican congressman from that state is marked for slaughter as a reactionary Republican, although he has tried to avert this disaster by frequently swearing allegiance in public to Roosevelt and Taft. But H. Clay Evans, Brownlow's ancient enemy, got to the president's ear first, and Brownlow has never been able to get a rehearing on the verdict against him. It is the Ohio situation on a small scale, with Brownlow in Foraker's roll, and Tennessee Republicans are as bitterly divided and as much excited as they can well be.

The post held by Hughes was awarded to a lieutenant of Evans named Jackson, but Hughes furnished the exception among federal officeholders in that he declined to submit tamely. Instead he made a scene at the White House and rode rough shod over the sensibilities of young Mr. Hitchcock, assistant postmaster general, who officiated as the mute with the bowstring. Hughes is an old confederate cavalryman who rode behind the great Forrest and who is therefore inclined to discount the exploits of rough riders in what he terms the "skirmish" before Santiago.

Hughes is a veteran of politics, too, one of the first confederates to join the Republican ranks, and he was one of the 306 delegates who voted for Grant at Chicago in 1860. He had John Wesley Gaines, a Democratic congressman from Tennessee, take him to the White House. "You dismiss me without a hearing, on the exparte testimony of a man who wants my job," cried the confederate loudly, waving a clenched fist on high for emphasis. "You shall have a hearing," said the president, while other callers in the executive offices stared in amazement. "I had two great grandfathers at Kings Mountain," persisted Hughes, more excited, "and my own grandfather commanded old Jackson's body guard at Talladega, and I don't come from stock that will stand for this kind of treatment without a fight."

## AGAIN INDICTED

Allen County Grand Jury Returns Bills Against Six Bridge Companies.

Lima, O., May 15.—Harry Hammond, of Toledo, manager of the Toledo branch of the American Bridge Company was among those indicted yesterday by the Allen county grand jury under the Valentine law. The American company, a New Jersey corporation, is the only new company accused. Officers and directors of the company, who are Pittsburg and New Jersey men, are indicted as individuals.

Prosecutor Welty decided on the indictments as a safeguard, because the old indictments expire on May 17, by limitations.

ORDINANCE NO. 27. To vacate an alley between lots No. 1934 and 1935 in Love's Third Addition to the City of Marion, Ohio.

Whereas on the 21st day of January, a petition by persons owning lots in the immediate vicinity of all that part of an alley lying between lots No. 1934 and 1935 in Love's Third Addition to the City of Marion, Ohio, abutting on the west side of Lee Street, was duly presented to the Council, praying that said alley be vacated between the points named, notice of the pendency and prayer of said petition was duly advertised in the Marion Star for six weeks, consecutively, ending April 24th, 1907; and Whereas, the Council, being satisfied that it will not be detrimental to the general interest and ought to be made, therefore:

Be it ordained by the Council of the City of Marion, State of Ohio: Section 1. That the alley as above described be and is hereby vacated.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage and legal publication.
