EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Will Hold Session Next Monday Night.

PLANS WILL BE MADE

For the Opening of the Coming Campaign This Fall.

Republicans Will Hold Convention Early in July and the Democrats Shortly After.

The first step in the coming campaign preliminary to the election of municipal officials to be held next fall, will be taken Monday evening, at a meeting of the Democratic Executive committee. The situation will be discussed and preliminary plans for the campaign will be made.

A member of the Republican executive committee stated this morning that the convention of that party will take place early in July. The democratic convention will not take place until probably two or three weeks afterward.

With the time for the convention drawing nearer, interest in the coming fight is increasing and the merry little bee is beginning to buzz about the bonnets of the ambitious ones.

For some time it looked as though Louis E. Myers would have no opposition for the republican nomination for solicitor, but now the friends of L. B. McNeal are beginning to urge him to try for the place, and it is said that he will consent to do so. In that case, Louie will have strong opposition for the nomination.

On the democratic side, it is stated that there is a strong probability of William P. Moloney trying for the nomination. Originally, Mr. Moloney, who is easily one of the city's most gifted young lawyers, had been slated as the next democratic nominee for county prosecutor. It is now likely, however, that he will try for the solicitorship. John Hemmiger, who was defeated by City Solicitor Donithen at the last election, will be after the nomination again.

The talk about John H. Bartram, the well-known attorney, being a receptive candidate for the republican mayoralty nomination appears to have been unfounded.

"It's all news to me," Mr. Bartram said, when asked regarding his supposed boom, recently. He says that if his friends are advocating him for the city's executive, they are doing so without his sanction. All summed up, it seems as if Mr. Bartram is not hampering after the job.

Second Hand Dealers Warned Not to Buy Junk From Minors—Police News.

The police are looking for Charles Daine, aged 16, the son of Scott Daine of 218 Uhler avenue, who left home Monday morning ostensibly to go to school but who has not returned to his home.

Daine it appears, had been punished for some infraction of the rules laid down by his parents and it is supposed that he either left the city or is staying with friends here.

During the past few months several dozen youngsters ranging in age from eleven to seventeen years of age, have been left home and the police have been able to find them. Complaints of this kind have been far more numerous this year than at any time in the past.

The police have issued a warning to second hand dealers and to private individuals that they are liable to prosecution if they purchase second hand articles from minors. The total disregard of the law in this respect has been responsible for much petty thieving by boys. The police have announced that offenders of this class will be arrested and fined the limit if apprehended.
