**TEACHERS WILL MEET AT PUT-IN-BAY IN JUNE**

Hon. Wade H. Ellis will Attend the Meeting.

Report of School Revenue Commission will be Made.

Perhaps the most important session of the Ohio Teachers' Association yet held will be that just announced for June 25 to 27 at Put-in-Bay. The Secretary of the Executive Committee, Supt. Edward M. Van Cleave of Steubenville has sent out to the teachers of the state over 20000 copies of the program and announcements. From his letter to the teachers we quote: "To the Teachers of Ohio: At the next session of the Ohio Teachers' Association will be presented the report of the School Revenue Commission appointed last year to secure information relative to the financial situation of the teaching profession, information of such reliable character that the Commission's findings will have weight when presented to the people and to the legislature. This Commission was requested by the Tax Commission appointed by the Governor to make a presentation, which has been done. The tax question is paramount in Ohio and some drastic action is looked for at the next session of the legislature. It behooves us to be watchful and active that the schools and the teachers be not forgotten."

The report of the Commission referred to above takes up the time of an entire morning session, the principal address being made by Hon. Wade H. Ellis, Attorney General of the State.

The program which appears below is certainly a well constructed one and provides something of interest for all classes and grades of teachers and for others interested in public education. It is refreshing to note that a newspaper man has been drafted into service and will give the teachers a view of things educational from a new standpoint. A schoolboard president is announced and an eminent lawyer, a woman noted for philanthropic work in Cincinnati and the gifted Miss June Adams of the famous Hull-Home, Chicago, will give the humanitarian and a feminine touch to the program.

**OHIO STATE SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.**

Ohio's Forty-eighth Annual State Sunday School Convention will be held in the city of Mansfield on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, June 25, 26 and 27, 1907.

Elaborate arrangements have been made by the city of Mansfield for the entertainment of this great gathering of Sunday school workers and the State Officers have prepared a program which promises to surpass anything ever before presented in the State of Ohio. Each county in the State is entitled to ten delegates which are elected at the County Convention or appointed by the County Executive Committee, or by the County Secretary. These favored ten will be entitled to entertainment on the Harvard Plan ("lodging and breakfast only") by the city of Mansfield but anyone desiring to do so may attend the convention and may have the privilege of the floor. **Carr's Trade Letter**

Weekly review of Grain Trade Conditions which are shaping prices prepared expressly for The Mirror by the Farmer Commission House of H. H. Carr & Company, 96 Board of Trade, Chicago, Illinois.

It has been a phenomenal week for the Chicago wheat trade and we might say for the wheat trade of the world. In this market the July price covered a range from 91 5-8 at the close last week to \$1.02 5-8 at the highest point this week. This was followed by a reaction of about 6 cents from the top before the close Saturday. The feature of the week was the frequent strong sensational upturns in prices caused by a great wave of buying both by the regular trade and the believers in high priced wheat all over the country. There has been such enormous profit taking—both locally and by the outside public that it continues to be a safe market for the exercising of judgment in buying wheat. The underlying crop conditions which put all the wheat months away over \$1 during the week still exist. Dry weather is again becoming a factor over both Kansas and Nebraska. The green bugs which worked such damage in the Southwest are now spreading into Nebraska. It is now discovered, also, that the recent freezing weather in May has caused winter wheat to head very short and the heads of the grain also stunted and likely to show blight when harvest is reached. "The Commercial West" the Minneapolis Trade Journal, conceded that Minnesota and the Dakotas will be short about 20 per cent wheat acreage. Better weather is giving some hope of a fair acreage in Manitoba, but this British wheat competitor will have little to spare for export compared with 1906. It is a con-
